Masonry will be uppermost in his endeavors.



ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

To the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

Brethren:

Once again we have assembled to resume our labors and deliberations: One of the duties of the Grand Master as listed in Section 2, Article X of the Constitution is to present a written address of the official acts of the Grand Master and it is my privilege to make this report.

Since being installed last year on June 14, 1980, the year, as you might expect, has been a busy one. My hope is that in this year's time I have in some small measure lived up to the high standards set by my predecessors.

I welcome you all to this 124th Annual Communication and as we move through our labors I would admonish you to vote for the good of the Fraternity.

To our Distinguished Guests, we are delighted with your presence and hope that you will enjoy your visit with us. May your stay be both pleasant and profitable.

NECROLOGY

During the year just passed, The Great Architect of the Universe in His Infinite Wisdom saw fit to call one of our Past Grand Masters, Alfred B. Saum, and 906 of our Brethren to the Celestial Lodge above. The Committee on Fraternal Dead will later make its report and pay tribute to the memory of our departed Brethren.

CORNER STONES

On Saturday, October 4, 1980, the Grand Officers conducted the time honored Corner-stone ceremony for the new Health, Recreation and Physical Education Building on the Campus of Peru State College, Peru, Nebraska. Due to the limited time given us by the College Board for this ceremony, the Oration had to be eliminated. Peru Lodge was the sponsoring Lodge on this occasion.

Saturday, April 25, 1981, brought the Grand Officers and our Brethren in force for the Corner-stone setting of the new Masonic Temple in Papillion, Nebraska. This new Temple will be beautiful and the Officers and members of Papillion Lodge No. 39 should be proud of their accomplishments. The Temple will be dedicated in the next Grand Lodge year.

Friday, May 15, 1981 brought the Grand Officers to Wood River, Nebraska, to lay the Corner-stone of a new Elementary School. Cement Lodge No. 211 at Wood River was the Host.

Our thanks go to our Grand Marshal, W. Brother William Keller for the arrangements on these ceremonies.

CONSOLIDATIONS

During the year Star Lodge No. 88, Decatur consolidated with Pilot Lodge No. 240, Lyons. On April 16, 1981, Gladstone Lodge No. 176 voted to consolidate.

Cork. I named W.: Walter S. Cork, Deputy Grand Custodian Emeritus. We will miss his labors but thank him for the good work he has done for Masonry in Nebraska.

MASONIC HOMES

Both The Nebraska Masonic Home at Plattsmouth and The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont, continue to be managed in a very efficient manner. Many thanks to the many Brethren who work hard at making these homes something that all Masons can be proud of. You will hear more of these homes later today.

MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

The Masonic Service Association continues to be a very vital part of our work. It was necessary to appoint a new Hospital Visitor for the Omaha Veterans Unit. I am pleased to say that we had a volunteer for this service. Brother Robert A. May. After viewing his qualifications, I appointed him to this post.

Our Past Grand Master, M. W. Herbert A. Ronin, recently retired as Chairman of the Association. His long years of dedicated work have earned him the respect of not only the Masons of Nebraska, but throughout the Country. It was my pleasure on March 19, 1981, to present M.W.Ronin, on behalf of the Masonic Service Association, a Resolution on his retirement, thanking him for his years of devoted service.

ANNIVERSARIES

November 3, 1980, Corinthian Lodge No. 83 celebrated their 100th birthday at a dinner. Strange to say, their lodge is older than the town of Wakefield, where the Lodge meets. The Lodge having been formed in another town and later moved.

GRAND LODGE AREA EDUCATION MEETINGS

Many changes have been made on this Committee and its work. The Education Meetings held last year were better attended than in some years and we will hear more in the Committee report.

TRIAL COMMISSIONS

It was necessary this last year to appoint three Trial Commissions for alleged violations of Section 3-102 of the Masonic Code, and two Commissions appointed a year ago have all completed their work.

A member of Hebron Lodge No. 43 was found not guilty as charged. A member of the Fremont Lodge No. 15 was found guilty and given a Definite Suspension of two (2) months. A member of Lincoln Lodge No. 19 was found guilty and expelled by the Commission. A member of John J. Mercer Lodge No. 290 was found guilty by the Commission and expelled.

A member of Centennial Lodge No. 326 was found guilty as charged and expelled by the Commission.

DISPENSATIONS

Special Dispensations were granted. One case to permit the conferring of the degrees without regard to time. Two cases to install some officers out of time. Two cases to elect and install out of time. Fee not waived in one case. One case to move Charter to confer outdoor degree. One case to confer Masters Degree on Nebraska Candidate at Lodge Martin, in South Dakota with permission of the Grand Master of South Dakota. One case to move Charter to a larger room for installation.

GENERAL PERMISSIONS

Permissions were given to Robert W. Boon Memorial Food Truck Committee to solicit the Lodges within a hundred mile area of Grand Island. Permission to the Omaha Masters and Wardens Club to solicit all Nebraska Lodges for Christmas Gift fund for The Nebraska Masonic Home. Permission was given for Franklin Lodge No. 264 to move into their new Temple. On receipt of the report of the Temple Building Advisory Committee, I approved the plans for construction of Republican Lodge No. 98.

DECISIONS

- 1. In reference to the proposed amendment to the Constitution presented at the 123rd Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, June 14, 1980. The resolution proposes to amend the Constitution, Article 13, Amendments, to the effect of changing Chapter 1 Section 3-102, paragraph "G". Chapter 1 Section 3-102, Paragraph "G" is a part of the Bylaws and can only be amended under Chapter 5, Section 1-502, Amendments. I therefore declared the Resolution void.
- 2. An inquiry from the Master of Mason City Lodge No. 170, regarding the Lodge appointing a Low Income Housing Authority. I replied as long as they were to name the Board for the Farmers Home Administration Low Rent Housing, with no Lodge funds, use of the Temple Lodge Room, Roster etc. To go ahead.
- 3. A request from a member of Crete Lodge No. 37, as to the legality of the Lodge renting their first floor space to a Godfather's Pizza franchise. They do sell beer. I ruled "I can no way equate a pizza parlor with a saloon". Also the Grand Masters Decision No. 4 in 1975-1976 against a bar in a building with a Lodge in it, Decision disapproved by Jurisprudence, and the Grand Masters Decision No. 2 in 1976-1977 allowing a grocery store to have an off sale beer license on the ground floor under a Masonic Lodge Room, approved by Jurisprudence. I approved the request to rent to Godfather's Pizza.
- 4. A request from the Master of Ponca Lodge No. 101, as to whether a disabled veteran paralyzed in both legs could be made a Mason. I replied by referring to Section 2-902 paragraph 5, and more especially to the sentence that starts on line 8 of paragraph 5. "The degree of conformity in all cases of physical disability shall be the determination and responsibility of the Lodge."

JUNE, 1981)

- 5. While attending the founding of the Grand Lodge of Alaska and after determining that they met all of the qualifications as set forth in Section 1-306 of the Code, Standards of Recognition, I granted the Grand Lodge, F∴&A∴M∴ of Alaska temporary recognition until this 124th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, A∴F∴&A∴M∴ of Nebraska.
- 6. The Grand Lodge A∴F∴&A∴M∴ of Iowa requeted a waiver of Jurisdiction on one Mr. Colin D. Botts, to petition one of the Lodges in Council Bluffs, Iowa. There is a long history of the Botts family belonging to this Lodge, his Father and Brothers. I granted the waiver as it would be impossible to have all lodges in Nebraska vote on this matter.
- 7. A request of the Master of Craftsmen Lodge No. 314 as to whether he should accept the charges brought by one member against another member of the Lodge. The first charge had to do with a serious misdemeanor conviction, not a felony in the State of Illinois. The Brother's Mother Lodge to which he still belongs saw fit not to charge him and gives a very good character reference. If this charge was to be filed it should have been in his Mother Lodge of the Jurisdiction of Illinois.

The other charges brought are the outgrowth of difficulties of a legal nature in a business transaction. Our law Section 3-204 forbids cognizance of such matters.

The Brother making the Charges may well be laying himself open to Masonic charges by spreading his dissatisfaction through the other Masonic bodies.,

I ruled that no charges should be accepted in this matter.

- 8. I granted a waiver of jurisdiction to the Grand Lodge F. &A. M. of Indiana, for the same reasons set forth in Decision #6.
- 9. A letter from Shelton Lodge #99 I stated that I could find nothing in our law that would prevent them from meeting in a hall owned by the I.O.O.F. That I could see no reason why they could not sell their present building if they find a buyer for it. That I doubted the wisdom of using any of the money received in buying a part ownership in the I.O.O.F. Hall. That it should be put in their operating fund and pay rent to the I.O.O.F.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Several Brethren in the Omaha-Lincoln area have requested that they be allowed to form "The Nebraska Masonic Research Society." After several long talks with members of this group, I feel that they do intend to carry out Masonic Research in Nebraska, and could be of great value to the Lodges and the Grand Lodge Education Committee. I recommend that they be allowed to use the name as herein given.
- 2. I recommend that a section be added to the law making all Jewels and Medals presented by this Grand Lodge remain the property of the Grand Lodge and be returned upon the death of the wearer.
- 3. I recommend that the Fees paid by each newly raised Master Mason to The George Washington Memorial Association be raised from

\$1.00 to \$5.00. This recommendation failed to pass at the 123rd Annual Communication but is badly needed.

ROCK MAUL

During one of my visitations, Centennial Lodge No. 326, presented me with a new gavel with the thought that it be used as a Traveling trophy. It is a rather different gavel. It is a Rock Maul, sixteen pounds in weight, with a bronze head. It was presented to me by the Past Masters of 1966 in Omaha area.

The maul has been used for its original purpose in a stone quarry, and has been beautifully refurbished and a square and compass worked into the metal.

I will, this evening, at our Grand Banquet present this Rock Maul to the Lodge that I feel best represents the best all around Lodge in our Jurisdiction. The Lodge selected will hold the Gavel for one year and return it to the Grand Lodge on the first day of the next Annual Communication. It then will again be presented to another Lodge by the then Grand Master.

As guide lines to awarding this Rock Maul, I have used the following: Officer Leadership; attendance; ritual; enthusiasm; fellowship; temple appearance and condition; bulletin or newsletter; Secretary reports and programs other than regular meetings and ritual meetings carried out through the year.

VISITATIONS

I have attended the Grand Lodges of Wyoming, Missouri, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Iowa, Colorado, Formation of the Grand Lodge of Alaska, Grand Masters Conference, Kansas, Minnesota, New York 200th Anniversary. I was also represented in Kentucky by M..W.: Warren D. Lichty, Jr. While attending the Grand Lodge of Alaska, it was my privilege to serve as installing Marshal for their first corp of officers.

On the evening of the day I was installed as Grand Master, I attended the Grand Assembly of the Order of Rainbow for Girls. This was my first official act as Grand Master. Later in the summer, I also attended the Grand Bethel of the Job's Daughters, and served as a Judge for their Miss Nebraska Job's Daughter Pageant. I also was present at the Nebraska State Chapter of the order of DeMolay where I had the opportunity to speak to the older DeMolay members on the subject of "What is Masonry". On all three of these occasions, it was my honor to present on behalf of the Grand Lodge, the Scholarships awarded by our Grand Lodge Youth Committee.

On June 15, 1980, a reception was held for the Grand Lodge Officers in my Lodge, Bellevue No. 325, and I owe a great big "thank you" to all who made this wonderful event.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE, A .: F .: & A .: M .: OF NEBRASKA

We continue to monitor activities in the World Wide Domain of Freemasonry that have come to our attention through the Committee on Recognition of the Grand Master's Conference.

The Commission follows these standards of Recognition:

1. Legitimacy of origin

- 2. Exclusive territorial jurisdiction
- 3. Adherence to the Ancient Landmarks, specifically a Belief in God, the volume of the Sacred Law as an indispensible part of the furniture of the Lodge, and the prohibition of politics and religion.

IRAN

It appears that Masonry in Iran may have been completely destroyed. All of the Lodges in Iran have been closed and the Masons who were not able to escape have been persecuted and some of them were executed. Until there is a change in the revolutionary government ruled by the Ayatollah Khomeini, there does not seem to be any possibility for the revival of Freemasonry in Iran.

SPAIN

The United Grand Orient of Spain has asked many of the Grand Lodges in the United States for recognition, however they fail to show any legitimacy of origin. We do recognize the National Grand Lodge of France, they have Lodges in Spain under their jurisdiction.

BELGIUM

We renewed relations with Belgium at the 123rd Annual Communication of our Grand Lodge. We now recognize the Reguliere de Belgique of Belgium, as do most of the Grand Lodges in the United States.

NIGERIA

Preliminary action was begun on the formation of a "Grand Lodge, A. \therefore A. \therefore M. \therefore of Nigeria in May of 1978. Subsequently the United Grand Lodge of England and the Grand Lodge of Scotland voted to sponsor a United Grand Lodge of Nigeria. There are 46 Scottish Lodges, 26 English Lodges, and 6 Irish Lodges in Nigeria. The English Lodges in Nigeria are still in the process of voting whether to join the new Grand Lodge of Nigeria or remain with the United Grand Lodge of England.

CUBA

There are 326 Lodges in Cuba that continue to operate in accordance with Masonic Law. The Masons of Cuba continue to operate regularly and courageously in spite of many difficulties.

ALASKA

Twelve of the nineteen Lodges Chartered by the Grand Lodge of Washington, in the state of Alaska, have formed a new Grand Lodge. The other seven remain under the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Washington. Our Grand Master, traveled to Alaska for the formation of the new Grand Lodge and granted them temporary recognition. He also served as Grand Marshal for the Installation of officers of the new Grand Lodge, at their 1st Grand Communication, on February 7, 1981. The meeting was held in Anchorage.

I recommend that the Grand Lodge of Nebraska grant recognition to

the Grand Lodge of Alaska, and that there be an exchange of representatives.

It said it was a person whose workis building. I was then referred to the word "Freemason" which wasdefined as a member of an International secret Society, having as itsprincipals, brotherliness, good will and charity. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE NEBRASKA WORK

M.W. Louis V. Sylvester, 281, Chairman, gave the report which was accepted.

To The Most Worshipful, The Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska: Your Committee on Nebraska Work is pleased to make the following report for the year just ending.

No matters of a controversial nature with respect to the Esoteric and Standard floor work, have been referred to the Committee for decision or interpretation. This reflects the fine manner in which the affairs of the Grand Custodian and the Deputy Custodians are fulfilling their responsibilities. Again this Grand Lodge owes a debt of gratitude to these brethren for their dedication and devotion. Their work is truly a labor of love. The Annual report of the Grand Custodian has been submitted to the Committee and reflects the continued progress of our degree work.

All vouchers and expense items of the Grand Custodians operation have been submitted and approved by the Committee. Although inflation continues to take its toll, yet the Grand Custodian has operated well within his budget for the year. The Committee has examined the budget request for the new year in the amount of \$10,900.00. It is the same request as made a year ago and again reflects the fine fiscal management of the Grand Custodian and his Deputies. We recommend approval of the request.

The Grand Custodian was examined as to the esoteric and standard floor work and found, not only proficient but practically perfect in both. The Committee was represented at the Annual Deputies School and examination held in Grand Island. We are happy to report that they proved highly proficient in all respects and it is this type of work that enables us to keep our work at such a high level of proficiency.

Upon proper certification by the Grand Custodian, the Committee was pleased to approve and recommend to the Grand Master the commissioning of Worshipful Brother Kenneth G. Fleming 75 as a Deputy Grand Custodian in District No. 31.

It was with extreme regret that the Committee noted the retirement from active service of Worshipful Brother Walter S. Cork, No. 75. The Committee approved the recommendation of the Grand Custodian to the Grand Master that he be commissioned a Deputy Grand Custodian Emeritus.

In general the work of the Grand Custodian and his staff of dedicated Deputies goes smoothly and the Craft, responding as they do, continue to hold our work at the high level of proficiency for which this Grand Lodge has long been noted. The Committee expresses their appreciation to all brethren for their continued devotion in this regard.

Fortunately, those in our charge in our Home are untouched. As has always been the norm, Love for each other prevails. We are content!

It has been a good year. We have 73 residents and we are slowly growing in number and your Home is proving to be popular.

We had 17 deaths—average age at death 91 years and average length of stay 13 years. We admitted during the year a total of 21 at an average age of 81 years. From that you can see that it was a busy year.

The Seal Fund continues to provide us with needed help. Please continue your support of this worthwhile endeavor.

Speaking of funds, the Endowment Fund continues to grow. We hope this will always be so. In the year 1980 this fund received \$332,000.00. The smallest item was \$100.00. The largest item was \$90,000.00. Please remember the Home in your endowment plans.

We had two Flu epidemics during the year and it was necessary for our doctor to quarantine the Home against visitors. Sometimes visitors are irritated at this, but it is for the health of our people as well as the visitor that we do this. It is lifted just as soon as the epidemic condition eases.

In February the Masters and Wardens Ladies Club delighted our ladies with Valentine candy cups and a nice Valentine visit. We are grateful.

The Mobile Nobles and their Ladies had a Valentine party also in February and music and singing filled our dining room. We again appreciate this kind act. Good friends such as these are precious.

Our parking lot was completed in October. The fence soon will be up and possibly the vandalism that has plagued us will stop.

In September the Scottish Rite Women's Club visited us. Good friends that they are, there were gifts, cards and a good time. These good people worked making diapers which we are always in need of. We thank them and the General Secretary of the Rite for their thoughtfulness and this gift.

18 members of Temple Chapter No. 271 Order of the Eastern Star made a tour of our building and this was followed by a good visit. Come back soon, please.

In October the food truck from the West Nebraska Builders Club, headed by Brother C. A. Stratton, came. The semi was loaded with potatoes and fresh vegetables. These fine men represent a lot of Lodges in their area and their dedication to this task is most appreciated. They really help our budget with what they bring.

In November, just a month later, the Bob Boon Memorial Food Truck, under the leadership of Brother Adolph Schlaman and his group, arrived. This truck was loaded with mostly canned goods and was estimated in value at \$8,066.00. Last year about the same load was estimated in value at about \$1,500.00 less—the reason, inflation. These great men, like their compatriots in Scottsbluff, are faithful to a fault. We love all of you and are most grateful.

We had a Halloween party in the Fall. Weird costumes, goblins and witches abounded. There were prizes for all manner of things and everybody had a good time. This holiday is not only for the young. Also in attendance were numerous Eastern Star Ladies from Elmwood and Plattsmouth. Cherry and apple cider was plentiful. Thanks for fun.

Mrs. Betty Pauley, Past Grand Worthy Matron, presented the Home with three wheel chairs. They were put in use at once. How we needed them and what a beautiful gift! Our thanks from the heart.

In September the County Clerk came to register all who needed to so they could vote. On Election Day the van loaded to the gills went to the polls and for those who could not go, we had absentee ballots. We vote at this Home.

\$416.00 was given by the Masters and Wardens of Omaha for the World-Herald newspaper. Beautiful! What would we do without these fine Brethren.

Brother Charles Kubich in the summer took four residents out for dinner. He is taking four each time until he has taken all our residents out as his guests. He's one fine person and don't doubt that he is loved by all our residents.

We are serving morning coffee in the solariums each day. Attendance is from 20 to 30 people. There is also singing and other programs. It's a very good cup of coffee and all enjoy it.

The Proficient Past Masters Club gave the Home three dressed turkeys for Thanksgiving. Thanks, friends. We appreciate your thinking of us with your generosity.

We pause at this point in our Annual Communication to pay homage to the memory of these departed brethren, and to commend them to the loving care of the Grand Master of the Universe. We extend our sincere and heartfelt sympathies to the families of these brethren.

Among the deaths recorded was that of our Past Grand Master. Most Worshipful Brother A. B. Saum, who departed this life on October 11, 1980. M. W. Brother Saum was born January 21, 1908 at Edgar, Nebraska. He was initiated into Rob Morris Lodge No. 46 on March 20, 1946; Passed to the degree of a Fellowcraft Mason on May 15, 1946; and Raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on October 23, 1946. He served as Worshipful Master of Rob Morris Lodge in 1951, and followed that service with more than 25 years of service as Secretary. He served the Grand Lodge of Nebraska as Grand Marshal from 1959 to 1963. In 1972 he was appointed Grand Junior Deacon of the Grand Lodge, and was elected and installed as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska on June 10th, 1977. M. W. Brother Saum was widely known in Masonic circles and was a member of a number of affiliated bodies. At the time of his death Brother Saum was Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Nevada near the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, and Grand Representative of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Indiana near the Grand Chapter of Nebraska. He was a member of York Rite bodies in Kearney and Hastings. He was a member of the Coordinate Bodies of the Scottish Rite at the Valley of Hastings, and, on December 9th, 1977, he was designated and invested as a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor. Brother Saum had been a certified Mason for thirty years. He was a member of Tehama Shrine in Hastings, an Honorary member of the Legion of Honor of DeMolay, and a member of Tuscan Chapter No. 35. Order of the Eastern Star at Kearney. The interests, activities and service to others of M. W. Brother Saum extended beyond his Masonry. In addition to various other offices held in his Church, the First Church of Christ Scientist at Kearney, he served as treasurer for 29 years. He was active in the Boy Scout movement and had served as Cubmaster. Of necessity, this report can only present this abbreviated listing of the Masonic and other activities of M. W. Brother Saum. His service to others, and the results of that service, will stand for years as a living memorial.

Also numbered among our departed brethren was W. Bro. Ralph R. Carleton on January 22, 1981. W. Brother Carleton served as Right Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Nebraska in

1963. W∴ Brother Ralph served the Grand Lodge of Nebraska as Grand Marshal in 1953. In 1969 he was elected Grand Secretary-Recorder of the York Rite Bodies and served in that post until 1980 at which time he was honored with election as Grand Secretary-Recorder Emeritus. In 1978 W.: Brother Carleton was elected an Honorary Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons of Nebraska and also an Honorary Grand Master of Cryptic Masons in Nebraska. In 1964 he served as Sovereign of Shiloh Conclave of the Red Cross of Constantine. He was a member of the Scottish Rite bodies in the Valley of Omaha and a member of Tehama Shrine in Hastings. He was a member of the Legion of Honor in DeMolay, a Past Prior of K.Y.C.H., a member of the Royal Order of Scotland, and many other York Rite Bodies. He was a member of Wenona Chapter No. 281, Order of the Eastern Star. Brother Carleton had served for a number of years as Secretary of Golden Rod Lodge No. 306 and also Secretary of Nebraska Lodge No. 1, where he held dual memberships. Masonry is grateful for men of high morals and integrity and W.'. Brother Ralph R. Carleton exemplified these qualities.

Your committee has this past year received, through the Office of the Grand Secretary, memorial cards from 32 other Grand Jurisdictions including 3 provinces of Canada, which reported to us the death of 39 Past Grand Masters and 1 Honorary Past Grand Master. Also reported were the deaths of a Deputy Grand Master, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer and a Grand Lecturer. To the members of these other jurisdictions we extend our sympathies in the loss of their devoted members.

The death of each of our brethren serves to remind us that life's events cannot be foretold, that its mysteries cannot be understood and that its ultimate and is inevitable. And while departure of even one lessens the whole, it is my belief that could we now ask each of these departed brethren for guidance concerning our loss - they would reply much like the following lines written by Helen Steiner Rice:

> "When I must leave you for a little while, Please do not grieve and shed wild tears And hug your sorrow to you through the years, But start out bravely with a gallant smile; And for my sake and in my name Live on and do all things the same-"

As an expression of honor for our fraternal dead at home and abroad let us now stand for a moment of silent meditation to be followed with prayer.

REPORT OF GRAND TRUSTEES

M. W. Harold Hultman, Past Grand Master, gave the report which was accepted.

The Grand Trustees are charged with the management of the funds of the Grand Lodge and the Nebraska Masonic Home. The annual audit reports of these funds by Deloitte Haskins & Sells cover the year's activity in detail. Copies are on file with the Grand Secretary. Salient, selected figures from these reports are shown below:

A few words need to be added about inflation. Inflation's effect should be noted in the increase of expenses stated above. And while the E & B Fund show a "surplus" of income above transfers for the operation of the Home, this is in a sense an illusion. In these inflationary times no small part of what is termed investment income is in fact an allowance for the depreciation of money. This allowance must be retained and reinvested to maintain the E & B Fund's ability to pay the ever increasing operation expenses of the Home. We should note that the Equity Fund Balances shown above are stated at cost and are substantially invested in bonds which in today's high interest rate markets are at discounted current valuations.

A further comment leading from inflation, — This year your Trustees moved to diversify the Home investments into a limited amount of common stocks with the conviction that in future years these investments will provide a degree of hedge against inflation.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REINSTATEMENTS

M. W. Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Brethren All:

Your Committee on Reinstatements reports to you at this time that during the past Grand Lodge year, we have received and acted favorably on "thirty" applications.

This is just a slight decrease in numbers from the previous year, being one less than reported to you a year ago.

The work of the Committee continues to be enjoyable and rewarding and we are pleased to be a part of getting these members back into their Blue Lodge as is their desire and ours.

We still continue to receive incomplete applications so we ask the Lodge Secretary and Master of each Lodge to check these carefully before they are submitted to our Committee. This avoids undue delay for both the Blue Lodge and the applicant.

Once again, my sincere thanks to W.B. Amos Campell and W.B.Kenneth Lott for their continued help and support.

28 Lodges failed to show name and date of presentation of their Bronze Jordon Medal Member or reason for omission.

Several Lodges late in mailing their Monthly Reports and Annual Returns without proper amount of remittance were observed.

It is imperative that these reports be filed within the prescribed time limit to avoid penalty and correspondence, Annual Return Reports must be complete in every detail with Financial Report and other pertinent information provided for to complete records in the Grand Secretary's Office.

With these few exceptions, the committee wishes to commend the Lodge Secretaries for their diligence in compiling their Monthly and Annual Reports to the Grand Secretary's Office.

The Committee also wished to comment the Grand Secretary and his efficient staff for the excellent manner in which these records are maintained and the courteous co-operation extended the committee while checking these Returns.

ELECTION OF GRAND LODGE OFFICERS AND VOTING ON RESOLUTIONS

M. W. BYRON C. JENKINS, GRAND MASTER

The hour has arrived for the election of Grand Officers and voting on the Resolution that was proposed last year.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved that section 3-102, subsection G, "The possession or use of all keys, ciphers, or printed matter relating to the ritualistic work of ancient craft masonry", be deleted from the by-laws.

Be it further resolved that an additional section be added to the by-laws in the proper place to read: "The Grand Lodge will provide key or cipher of the ritualistic work of Ancient Craft Masonry to any subordinate Lodge who so desires such key or cipher. The key or cipher will not be used in the lodge room. This resolution was again defeated.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES

M. W. Frank J. Mattoon, Past Grand Master and Chairman, gave the report which was accepted.

(1) A brother of Centennial Lodge No. 326 of Omaha was suspended by the Trial Commission after being convicted by the District Court of Douglas County, Nebraska, which conviction was affirmed upon appeal by the Supreme Court of Nebraska upon the charge of murder.

The Committee on Grievances recommends that the penalty be disapproved and the penalty of Expulsion be imposed. Approved.

(2) A brother of Hebron Lodge No. 43 was charged with unmasonic conduct arising from transportation of Marijuana from Mexico to the United States. The Trial Commission found the Brother not guilty of unmasonic conduct in that he did not participate in the transportation of Marijuana and cooperated with the Federal Authorities in the handling of the case.

The Committee on Grievances recommends that the decision of the Trial Commission be affirmed. Approved.

(3) A brother of Fremont Lodge No. 15 pleaded guilty to charges filed by the lodge and the Trial Commission recommended definite suspension for two months after pleading guilty in the District Court of Dodge County; Nebraska, to the charges of unauthorized acceptance of funds illegally and placed upon probation for one year and fined \$1500, costs and restitution of funds.

Brother David E. Menck disqualified himself from participating in the recommendation of the Committee on Grievances for this case.

The remaining members recommend the action of the Trial Commission be affirmed. Approved.

(4) A brother of Lincoln Lodge No. 19 was charged with unmasonic conduct under Section 3-101 and Section 3-102 (a) of the Masonic Code after accepting Pre-Trial Diversion in lieu of trial founded upon criminal charges. The trial Commission recommended that a finding of guilty to the Masonic charges should be entered and the Brother be expelled. Brother L. R.Ricketts disqualified himself in this case in the decision of the Committee on Grievances.

The Committee on Grievances recommends that the recommendation of the Trial Commission be affirmed. Approved.

(5) A brother of John J. Mercer Lodge No. 290, Omaha, Nebraska, was charged with unmasonic conduct founded upon the conviction of the charge of "Solicitation" of another person to commit burglary in the District Court of Pottawattie County, Iowa. The Trial Commission considered the proceedings in said Court and "expelled" the accused brother.

The Committee on Grievances recommends that the action of the Trial Commission be modified to the extent that a penalty of expulsion be recom-

mended rather than be imposed; and that as so modified, said recommendation be affirmed. Approved.

REPORT OF THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC NATIONAL MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION

M..W.: Warren D. Lichty, Jr., Past Grand Master and Chairman gave the report which was accepted.

M∴W∴ Sir, brothers, the George Washington Masonic National Memorial is your National Masonic monument. Some of you have visited there, I am sure all of you have seen pictures of this beautiful building. You have all contributed to it, some of you have become life members of the Association and some of you may have helped with the original building fund or one of the funds raised to furnish one of the rooms of the Memorial. The great majority of you made your contribution the night you were raised to Master Mason. That night the Secretary of your lodge asked you for one dollar for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. You pulled a dollar bill out of your billfold, handed it to the Secretary and proceeded to forget all about it, I will wager. That one dollar fulfilled your financial obligation to the Memorial Association as a Mason for the rest of your life.

Now, because of inflation, Grand Lodges across the country are raising their once in a lifetime contribution from \$1.00 to \$5.00. Today, the newly raised Master Mason will pull a five out of his billfold with no more thought than you gave to the one that you contributed. Something approaching half of the Grand Lodges have already made this change, let us now follow suit, so that newly raised Master Masons of Nebraska will also make this modest once in a lifetime contribution of \$5.00.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH COMMITTEE

M. W. Grand Master and brethren:

We have just heard from our youth and as you have very aptly noted, they need no one to speak for them. I can only add a few brief comments.

First, I should note that the report of our Grand Master is perhaps more modest than it should be. He was present at the statewide meetings of all three of our Youth Organizations. At the Grand Bethel session and DeMolay Conclave, he was active participant throughout the meetings. I know I can speak for the youth and the adults who are privileged to work with them when I say, "Thank you M.'.W.'. Sir, your attendance and concern are greatly appreciated. The schedule of a Grand Master is very crowded and the time you spent with the youth was a priceless gift indeed."

I might add that \mathbb{R} . \mathbb{W} . Bro. Wurdeman is certainly no stranger to the youth organizations in the Columbus area, and our \mathbb{V} . \mathbb{W} . Bro. Jim DeMoss is well known to the Job's Daughters across the State. He has also worked in DeMolay. Two of our visiting brethren are strong supporters of youth. \mathbb{R} . \mathbb{W} . Bro. Ray Horn, Deputy Grand Master from South Dakota, was a Chapter Dad in DeMolay for 10 years, and he is still an active Advisor. \mathbb{R} . \mathbb{W} . Bro. Robert Jackson, Deuty Grand Master of Kansas is an Advisor of the DeMolay Chapter in Topeka. If brethren whose schedules are as busy as Grand officers schedules must be, in this jurisdiction and others, have time for Youth, what excuse have the rest of us for our lack of involvement?

(OMAHA,

I seem to recall a line from Tennyson, from "Idyls of the King" I believe, that goes "The old order changeth, yielding place to new". Brethren, whether we like to think of it or not, we are the old order. We have just heard from three fine representatives of the new. Yet each of them said they look to us, the old order, for support and guidance. Dare we let them down?

REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE

M.W. Merle M. Hale, Past Grand Master and Chairman, presented the report which was accepted.

We recommend that the mileage allowance for the coming year be 20¢ per mile which is the standard mileage rate allowed by the Internal Revenue Service for tax purposes.

We recommend that the salary account be increased from \$61,890.00 to \$65,000.00. This account includes the salaries of the Grand Secretary, Grand Custodian, office staff, Grand Lodge share of social security and Federal and State unemployment tax. The increase amounts to approximately 5%. Anticipating that we will have a new Grand Secretary we did not provide for an increase this coming year. We are recommending that the Grand Custodian's salary be increased from \$15,620 to \$16,800. With no provision for an increase for the Grand Secretary, funds will be available for a 7% merit increase for the other employees.

Our budget includes \$3,600 retirement payment to our outgoing Grand Secretary. This is in accordance with an agreement with the Grand Trustees that M..W. Bro. Lallman would not be included in the pension plan set up for employees a few years ago. At that time his age and remaining years of service would have created an extremely large payment into the pension fund in order to keep it properly funded.

As we told you last year our Grand Lodge income is barely covering our expenses. The Committee is seriously considering charging some allocation of salaries, rent and utility expense to The Nebraska Masonic Home to partially cover the expense of the Home work that is done in the Grand Lodge office. The Board of Trustees of the Home have long been aware of this situation.

It is with regret that we record the retirement of M.'.W.'. Norris Lallman. He has been a capable Grand Secretary and a real joy to work with. We commend the efficient office staff and Grand Custodian for their usual fine work.

REPORT OF THE TEMPLE BUILDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE

M. W. Russell L. Fickes, Past Grand Master and Chairman, presented the report which was accepted.

M. W. Sir, Papillion Lodge No. 39, Papillion cornerstone laid by Grand Master Byron C. Jenkins, April 25, 1981. Lebanon Lodge No. 323, Columbus, new temple building nearing completion.

Franklin Lodge No. 264, moving into their new temple.

Republican Lodge No. 98, plans for new temple approved by Grand Master.

Bassett Lodge No. 254, planning purchase of a building for a new temple.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELIEF

W.: Paul L. Toombs, Chairman, presented the report which was accepted.

Your Committee paid out to the Lodges in Grand Island \$250.00 for Tornado Relief to be administered by the lodges. We paid out \$300.00 to our regular annuitant, making a total paid out of \$550.00.

Income to the Grand Lodge for the benefit of the Committee consisted of \$75.00 reimbursement by the Lodge in the Denver area for our advance to their member stranded during a snowstorm; \$100.00 specifically for Grand Island Tornado Relief from a private individual and \$100.00 from a private individual for general use by the Committee on Relief. Recap: Total Payments \$550.00; total receipts \$275.00; net paid out \$275.00. These figures are for the term May 1, 1980 to May 1, 1981 year.

Since May 1st we have assisted Valley, Nebraska lodge in handling a request from Masonic Service Association in California for burial funds for the member of that lodge who passed away in California. That will be reported next year.

Apparently the individual lodges are handling their Relief matters in an admirable way. We are glad to assist in any way we can.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

M. W. Herbert A. Ronin, Past Grand Master and Chairman Emeriti, MSA presented the report which was adopted.

The 62nd Annual Meeting of the Masonic Service Association of the U.S. was held February 16, 1981 at Orlando, Florida. As Emeritus-Chairman of its Executive Commission my duties were greatly reduced. I participated in the meetings and deliberations of the Executive Commission which has continued my membership on its Investment Committee. A Resolution of Appreciation of my past service was passed by the Executive Commission. It was later formally presented to me by our Grand Master Byron C. Jenkins at the Annual Meeting of the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska in March, 1981. This completes my sixteen years of active service as a member of the Executive Commission, of the Masonic Service Association. Forty-three of our Grand Lodges, including Nebraska, comprise the constituent members of the Association. Almost all of their Grand Masters were present at the meeting including our own Grand Master. Also in attendance from Nebraska were $M.\.W.\.$ Warren D. Lichty, Jr., Past Grand Master who was Vice-chairman of the Conference which was in session the following day; R..W.. Harold C. Wurdeman, Dep. Grand Master; and $M.\.W.\.$ Norris W. Lallman, our Grand Secretary.

The Annual Report of the M.S.A. was presented by M. W. Robert A. Hockstad, P.G.M. of Michigan. The Report reflects a marked increased activity of our hard-working Executive-Secretary & Treasurer, R. W. Stewart M. L. Pollard, and the first year of splendid service of our new Director of Hospital Visitation, M. W. Thomas R. Dougherty, P.G.M. of New Jersey, who is in attendance at our session.

The increased costs of postage, printing and paper have necessarily caused an increase in the subscription costs of our Short Talk Bulletins by .50 cents per year. The 1980 monthly issues were devoted to basic Masonic subjects which have been well received. The number of individual subscribers to *The Short Talk Bulletin* has doubled for the third year in a row. The M.S.A. has just recently converted its greatly increased mailing lists to the computer which will make this service more efficient and in accordance with modern business methods.

A new catalog listing all M.S.A. publications, films and materials has been published and is available on request and should be in the possession of every Secretary of our Lodges or the Chairman of the Masonic Education Committee. Three recent films may now be rented from the M.S.A. for a service charge of \$10.00. These are the Northern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite's film, "Courage To Lead;" the Knights Templar film, "Soldiers of The Cross;" and the Shrine's film, "Symbol of Pride".

The *Emessary Notes*, the monthly newsletter from our Executive Secretary has been very well received and keeps us abreast with recent Masonic news and developments.

Our Hospital Visitation Program is wholly supported by voluntary contributions. This is truly one of the great charitable activities of our Grand Lodge and deserves not only our commendation but adequate financial support from our Grand Lodges, our concordant bodies and individuals! There are presently 109 Medical Centers being served with Field Agents and their volunteers. These include the Omaha and Lincoln Medical Centers. I wish to particularly commend the splendid service of Brother Robert Adamcheck, Field Agent of our Lincoln V.A. Hospital. His years of volunteer service and devotion to his labor of love for his fellow man has been outstanding!

REPORT OF FIELD AGENTS

ROBERT MAY

I wish to thank the three brothers who were instrumental in my becoming the Masonic Service Association of the U.S.'s representative at the Omaha V.A. Medical Center. Brother Alan Wolcott, who first introduced me to the Hospital Visitation Program, when he started there as its first representative, Most Worshipful Brother Thomas Dougherty, the M.S.A. Director of Hospital Visitation, who extended his invitation for me to assume the representative role when Brother Wolcott was forced to resign, and Most Worshipful Brother Byron C. Jenkins who approved me for the position.

The past six months have been highly rewarding and very instructive for me. I have found that giving of myself has no higher reward. Indeed, it is a two-way street; the more one puts in, the more one gathers. Many of my pre-visitation thoughts have been drastically altered. Getting to know the frustrations, tragedies, and sense of helplessness of another human has helped me get my house in order. It has taught me we are indeed our brother's keeper, and it is our loss if we do not assume that role. In helping to alleviate the frustrations, depressions, and sadness brought to a fellow man by the diagnosis of a terminal, or other debilitating disorder, the Masonic Service Association hospital visitor is representing the Masonic Fraternity in its finest image. One of the distinctions of the Hospital Visitation Program is that it is for all those who have borne the battle, not just Masons. Many patients are longing for conversation and human fellowship and are so sincerely grateful for whatever time you can give them. The uniqueness of each individual, within our earthly brotherhood, has shown me another master stroke by the Supreme Architect.

However, I would like to see a greater awareness of the Masonic Service Association of the U.S. and its Hospital Visitation Program spread throughout our state. To help bring about an awareness of the Hospital Visitation Program, I highly recommend all brothers listening to either read, or re-read, the February 1981, Short Talk Bulletin, entitled "A Member of the Family". Most Worshipful Brother Thomas Dougherty, the M.S.A.'s Director of Hospital Visitation, has given a concise, enlightening view of what every member of the team can do, may do, or better yet, does do, in this Short Talk Bulletin.

I will be happy to cooperate with any member of any Masonic group in the Omaha area who has a few hours a month to give as a member of the Omaha M.S.A. team.

I spend two days a week at the Medical Center presently; so I cannot spread myself far enough around. A few more to help carry the ball would be another two-way street experience, I'm sure.

Samuel Butler, the English satirist, once said, "You can do very little with faith, but you can do nothing without it.". I echo his thought, and know we can build a Hospital Visitation Program here in Nebraska that every branch of the Masonic family will take pleasure in being a member of. Let's give thought toward this.

I thank all Grand Lodge Officers, Visitors, and Brothers present for allowing me this time. Thank you.

A MERE VOLUNTEER

If you have never guided a wheelchair of a patient down the hall, Helped a man who has given this country his love, his health, his all.

If you have never sat with the ailing, seen the pain and sensed their fear.

Then you cannot share in the feeling of the needy volunteer.

Have you paced with the wife of a Veteran and discussed the time of day,

Tried diverting her mind for a moment as her husband passed away,

Have you offered a shoulder to lean on and a kleenex for a tear? It is all part of the life that is lived daily by the volunteer.

Sympathetically listening to memories of a patient racked with pain,

With a smile, a cheerful word and a handshake, that envokes "please come again,"

If a patient had said, "thank you kindly," it was music to the ear And the greatest payment in this world of the V.A. Volunteer. If each one of us walked down those hallways with a volunteer one day.

If each one gave a thought to the Veteran and the price they had to pay,

And we spend succeeding years

Giving thanks unto God our Creator, for those faithful volunteers.

I am happy to report, besides myself, we have two full time Deputies. Brother Stephen Taylor works recording volunteer hours besides assisting in the visitations. Brother Taylor has 1839 hours of volunteer time.

Brother Max Hinkson is also a full time Deputy and makes all the name, desk, and room signs and pins at the hospital besides assisting in out visitation program. Brother Hinkson has 1450 hours of volunteer service.

I have 6505 hours in 6 years and my duties are looking after our Brothers at the Medical Center. I also have charge of the coffee program. This requires the making of the coffee and taking it to the outpatient area and around to the hospitalized patients and visitors. I do this five days a week and all holidays. I spend seven hours a day carrying out these duties, Monday thru Friday. I also have served on hospital committees to bring in outside input. We are very fortunate that the staff and employees have accepted the employees of Masonic Service with open arms which makes our work a pleasure. We at all times try to cooperate with the staff, employees, and patients, knowing we will work and assist them; they in turn help us.

This about covers our work at the hospital and now I would like you Brothers of the Grand Lodge to consider a few proposals that will help the Field Agent Program. They are as follows:

- 1. I would recommend that with notice of dues, an envelope be included for donations to Masonic Service Association or Welfare fund. Nebraska is very weak in contributions to Masonic Service Association; in fact it hardly pays for one Field Agent. In Lincoln we accept no pay as we feel it is a privilege to serve our Brothers; in fact it is part of our Masonic obligation.
- 2. All Lodges be notified of any Mason using the facilities of a VA Hospital, that the patient contact the Field Agent. This can be done by telling the Nursing Staff as we can not check names or records because of the privacy Act.
- 3. Whenever any Officer or Brother has time and are in a city where we have a Veterans Hospital, stop by and ask for the Masonic Field Agent and I am sure he will be happy to show you around. We would be honored to have you as a guest to see first hand how the Field Agents represent you and all our Brethren. We are proud to be Masons and the work we do.

In closing, I want to thank the Officers of the Grand Lodge and members of our Great Masonic body for giving me and my Deputies the privilege of serving you and our hospitalized Masonic Veterans.

M. W. THOMAS R. DOUGHERTY, FIELD AGENT, MASONIC SER-VICE ASSOCIATION

M. W. Grand Master, Distinguished members of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, the visiting dignitaries and my brethren all. I am very happy to be here today. M. W. Grand Master, I have had warm receptions before, but you have taken the cake. You have gone a little too far. Thank you very much for your hospitality. It really has been a joy to be here with you and to be treated so kindly, you Nebraska men really know how to do it.

These two men you see, that you just heard speak to you represent Masonry all over the world and they are to be complimented. I just left the hospital today, and we toured it with Brother May and the Director of the Hospital told me that on the next Wednesday when they have awards day in that hospital, that Brother May will receive an award for 7500 hours of service at the Veterans Hospital. Also a special award for brotherhood and going the extra mile.

Somewhere in the hospital this morning, there is somebody who couldn't bend down to tie his shoe, but there was a Masonic volunteer to do it for him. There was somebody who couldn't shave this morning, but there was a volunteer there to do it for him. There was somebody that had to be wheeled to therapy and he couldn't go himself, but there was a Mason to represent you and me. Anything that you can think of, that you take for granted on a daily basis is being done by Masons throughout this country. For not only Masons, but for anybody who needs our help.

Reading the Bible, writing letters, calling home, letting the family know how they are making out. Making arrangements for the families when they come to the hospital to stay over night.

Last year, 71,000 Masonic visits were made for a total of better than half a million hours of Masonic charity.

Veteran hospitals are really one our greatest charities. I hope you will think about it and realize that this is something that can be done throughout the country and can be really expanded but what we need brethren is you. You have got to get involved. You have got to take part in it. Like these two brethren have already told you. Make arrangements to visit the hospital and just see what is being done. It will make you feel ten feet tall and you will go away feeling like you have done something for somebody else. If you have a few hours a week or month, volunteer to assist these men. It will make your world, your life. If you are retired, it will give you purpose in life. It will give you a goal, it will make you feel like you are wanted because you will be doing God's work. Masonry is just another name for charity. It is the cornerstone for our institution. I challenge the Grand Lodge Officers of Nebraska - to next year dedicate at least one visit to each one of these hospitals and see what is going on, and come back and tell you what happened. Yes, my brethren, we are our brother's keeper, but Masonry is on the incline. Don't let anybody tell you it is going downhill. Like the bee, my brethren. You know the wings on a bee are so weak it can't fly can't possibly hold up his body, but the bee doesn't know it, so consequently, he flies all over, spreading the pollen, making life pleasant for us. You are here today, because you want to be, not because you had to be. With that kind of men involved, Masonry cannot fail. God Bless you and get involved in this Hospital Visitation Program. Thank you for this time and the opportunity to speak to you.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

W. Lawrence J. Zwart, presented the report which was adopted. Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren:

The Finance met at the Grand Lodge Offices at 11:30 a.m. on Friday, May 22, for the purpose of examining the vouchers for proper authorization and appropriate cash disbursements. Present were Chairman, Edwin G. Mortensen, Sidney W. Irwin, Lawrence Zwart. We found a duplication of payment on one account and were made aware that the Office Staff had previously noted the error. Credit has been authorized but yet has not been received by our Office.

We were especially thankful for the cooperation of both Brother Vince Keerbs, the Office Accountant, and the Grand Secretary Lallman in providing information and courtesy.

THE MASONIC-EASTERN STAR STUDENT FUND COMMITTEE

You Masonic-Eastern Star Student Fund Committee submits the following report.

As most of you know, the responsibility of this joint committee is to sponsor the young people from our Children's Home in Fremont, in their further education after graduation from high school.

Last year each Grand Body was asked for \$5000. for each of two high school graduates from the Home. Nancy Gerke who had elected to enroll at Doane College in Crete, dropped out of school mid-term for reasons unknown to us.

We are pleased to report that Donna Barnoski who enrolled at Midland College in Fremont, is progressing satisfactorily. And acccording to reports from her sponsor and the Dean of Women, has good potential for the 81-82 term.

After checking we find that the cost of tuition fees and books will be somewhere between \$3500.00 and \$3600.00. This figure, along with her monthly allowance would amount to around \$4200.00.

We are requesting an appropriation from each Grand Body of \$2100.00.

There will be no new graduates from the Home this year requiring educational assistance.

REPORT OF MASONIC EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

The privilege of having served as president of your Children's Home for another year has been a unique and gratifying experience. The vitality, dedication and singularity of purpose exhibited by my fellow trustees has had an electrifying effect on the operation of your Home. It is axiomatic that the quality of care at the Home is measured by the competence and dedication of those individuals who are entrusted with its administration. I offer you positive assurance that the children continue to be cared for in an exemplary manner consistent with the ideals, concepts and teachings of Masonry.

Benjiman Harvey, who prefers to be called Ben, assumed the position of Administration in September, 1980. Mr. Harvey is married and he and his wife Chalice, have two children, Shara, age 9, and Eric, age 7. Mr. Harvey is a graduate of Kearney State College where he received a Master's Degree in Education. Prior to coming to the Home, Ben was an Industrial Arts teacher for twelve years in North Bend, Nebraska. He is active in Masonry, and presently serves as Sr. Warden of North Bend Lodge No. 119, Worthy Patron of Ruth Chapter No. 119, serving with his wife who is Worthy Matron, and is Past High Priest and Commander of Fremont's York Rite bodies. Ben's administration can accurately be characterized as one of enthusiasm and dynamic leadership.

The expense of operating the Children's Home for the forthcoming fiscal year will be increased over that of last year; however, the contribution requested from the two Grand bodies will be identical to the previous year, to-wit: The sum of \$15,000 per organization. The ability to maintain the financial request made from the two Grand bodies at a fixed level for several years, notwithstanding the spiraling inflation, results from the watchful care of a competent and dedicated Finance Committee Your Board of Trustees is satisfied that the Home is being fiscally managed in a responsible and prudent manner. The importance of familiarizing our Masonic and Eastern Star members, and the Nebraska community at large for that matter, of the operation of our Home has been given considerable attention by your Board of Trustees. A new and bold endeavor entitled "Ambassador Program" has been inaugurated for the express purpose of disseminating information about the Home. Anyone who is willing to donate his or her time, and travel at their own expense, to serve in the capacity as a Home Ambassador should contact the Home Administrator, Mr. Ben Harvey, for particulars. Individuals who volunteer will undergo training sessions and will ultimately be assigned a specific geographic area in which he or she will serve. The Ambassador Program will fulfill a longstanding need to spread the message of the good work that is being done at the Children's Home.

An efficient and more comprehensive system of accounting has been initiated at the Home during the past year. M : W : Brother Donald R. Swanson graciously accepted the responsibility of designing and implementing the program and we are truly grateful for his efforts.

In the past, many matters relating to the business of the Home were handled in Omaha, Nebraska, in the office of the Grand Secretary, Order of the Eastern Star. This circumstance was largely due to the fact that the Grand Secretary and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees was one and the same person, Wilma Harms. After Wilma's retirement from the office of Grand Secretary, it was felt that it would be more desirable to handle all business operations at the Home's principal office in Fremont, Nebraska. Should any of you have need to contact the Home for any reason whatsoever, it is urged that you do so by communicating with or addressing your correspondence to the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children, 2415 North Main Street, Fremont, Nebraska 68025.

The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron of the Order of the Eastern Star dedicated a portion of their year's project by arranging to have air-conditioning installed in the Administration Building offices with the exception of the area occupied as a gymnasium. A message of gratitude is extended to Helen Brannon, Past Worthy Grand Matron, and Charles House, Past Worthy Grand Patron, for their thoughtfulness and generosity.

On behalf of the children at the Home, and your Board of Trustees, I extend a sincere thank you to all of those thoughtful and caring individuals who have made donations in any form whatsoever to the Home during the past year. Your continued financial support and concern for the children is an essential and integral part in the operation of the Home, without which it would all be impossible.

I previously made reference to the efforts of M. W. Brother Donald R. Swanson, who has been a faithful servant to the Home. I also want to compliment and congratulate the other Masonic brethren who serve as trustees for their tireless and dedicated contribution to the welfare of the Home. Brothers Paul Eveland, Elmer Sells, Ed Lorenzen and Fred Moshier have continuously given of their talents and energy. I am justifiably proud to serve with these brethren.

An invitation is extended to all of you to visit the Home during the forthcoming year. Any visit to the Home will be a memorable experience for you and likewise, will serve as an inspiration to the children. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP

W. Charles W. Amidon, Chairman presented the report which was adopted.

Realizing that the future of Masonry in Nebraska is directly related to an increase in membership or at least a stabilization of existing membership, this Committee was appointed at the 123rd Annual Communication held in June of 1980.

For the Masonic year 1980-81, the efforts of the Committee were confined to those Lodges located on or east of Highway 14. It is the intent of the Committee to concentrate its efforts toward those Lodges west of Highway 14 in the 1981-82 year.

The main thrust of our efforts was toward encouraging Lodges to hold Informational Dinners to which non-masons and their wives were invited as guests of the Lodge. The results obtained by those Lodges who participated in these events has been most gratifying and has convinced the Membership Committee to pursue this project with all possible vigor in the coming year.

Funding for this most successful program is provided on an equal basis by four bodies of Masonry; The Grand Lodge, Omaha Valley of the Scottish Rite, Grand York Rite and Tangier Shrine. The funds provided enabled the Committee to underwrite the cost of Guests' dinner up to \$5.00 each, which allowed Lodges to participate without expending any of their own funds. It is hoped that as this worthwhile project gains statewide acceptance, other subordinate bodies will want to join in with financial, as well as moral, support.

Although complete statistics were not available at the time this report was prepared, we can report the following partial results:

1. No. of Lodges contacted in 1980-81	141
2. No. of Lodges responding to invitation to hold dinner	
3. No. of Lodges who have held dinners to date	47
4. No. of Lodges which did not respond	
5. No. of Lodges which indicated they were not interested .	
6. No. of petitions which resulted from dinners (estimated).	96+

In addition to the above direct results, several of the Lodges are confident that additional petitions will be forthcoming in the fall of 1981.

The cooperation and participation of all lodges is earnestly solicited and it is recommended that a Friendship Dinner, Guest Night, Informational Get-together or some similar program be endorsed and made a part

of the annual activities of every Lodge.

It is not the intent of the Committee to interfere in the internal affairs of any Lodge. We were appointed to help when requested and to provide assistance in planning such events. It is hoped that as word of this successful program spreads throughout the state, each Lodge will assume the responsibility of conducting its own program on a continuing annual basis.

MASONIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

M..W. T. Leo Stines, Past Grand Master, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

Your committee on Masonic education changed the format of the area Masonic education meetings this year and we are very pleased with the results.

For many years we have tried to have afternoon meetings with a banquet in the evening followed by a talk on the methodology of conducting guest night meetings. Inasmuch as the Grand Lodge has a fine, hard working and highly successful membership committee, whose prime concern is conducting guest night meetings, we felt that to include a talk on this subject at our area meetings was superfluous and redundant.

Therefore we have held meetings starting at seven o'clock in the evening and have presented talks by the Deputy Grand master, the Grand Wardens and the Grand Senior and Junior Deacons covering such subjects as, administration, lodge programs, sustaining membership, conducting open meetings and on the duties of the local lodge's education committee. These subjects seemed to be of prime interest and engendered much enthusiasm and audience participation.

We divided the state into two areas by drawing an imaginary line down Highway 14 from Niobrara on the north to Superior on the south. All lodges east of this line, with two exceptions, were given the privilege to attend an area masonic education meeting during this grand lodge year. Hopefully, all the lodges west of Highway 14 will have the same opportunity during the 1981-'82 grand lodge year.

We held 12 area meetings beginning September 9th at Plainview, then Columbus, Fremont, Bellevue for all the Omaha area lodges, then at Weeping Water and on to Craftsman Lodge for all the Lincoln lodges and at Humboldt, Dewitt, Geneva, Stromsburg, Wakefield and finished up at Oakland May 2nd.

The committee felt that by dividing the state into two districts and only covering the one section this year and leaving the remaining section for next year we could cut our expenses considerably and still give everyone an

opportunity to attend such a meeting at least every other year. Additionally, we felt that if the person who should be present, actually did attend, then once every two years would be often enough.

We were very pleased by the percentage of lodges represented. For instance, at our last meeting, which was held at Oakland, nine of the ten lodges invited were represented. This was extremely gratifying and we look forward to next year with great expectations.

In regard to the anticipated cut in expenses, even though next year will result in a lot more traveling than this past year, the committee has requested a budget allocation of only 85 percent of the current budget. In this time of runaway inflation we feel this effort toward fiscal restraint to be noteworthy.

FRIDAY EVENING PRESENTATIONS

M.'.W.'. HERBERT A. RONIN, PAST GRAND MASTER:

M. W. Grand Master, very Distinguished Guests, our lovely ladies, my brethren. I deem it a treasured privilege to be invited to make this presentation of the 50 year badge of Masonry to this most worthy brother whom I am sure most of you know quite well, you know about his musical talents. We do not have, in the line of our officers, an office of the Grand Organist or Grand Musician, but I want to tell you that he is a Grand Musician as you know. I would be amiss if I did not touch on some of the highlights of his wonderful life, that some of you might not be acquainted with. I will just do that very briefly.

Our Worshipful Brother Edward Howard Lockwood was born at Valentine, Nebraska, and he graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan University with his Fine Arts degree, majoring in piano in 1929. He went shortly thereafter to Scottsbluff to pursue his chosen profession as instructor in piano and organ. And he pursued this profession there in Scottsbluff for 34 years. There was a hiatus in there for 38 months in which he served in the Navy. Of course, I know you are a member of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars and active in both these organizations. In 1953, there was a radical change in Ed's life. He was elected Secretary of the Four coordinate bodies of the Scottish Rite, Valley of Hastings and the Recorder of Tehama Shrine at Hastings.

These are dual offices but that meant that he was working full time and the Lockwoods moved to Hastings in 1963. Ed served as Recorder of the Shrine there for 7 or 8 years. He still is serving the Scottish Rite as Secretary and he is our Senior Veteran Secretary of the Valleys of Nebraska. As his Inspector General, I can vouch that he has been very efficient, he is a man of integrity, a man that everyone loves and he certainly is a fine Secretary in every respect. I want to say something about his Masonic record. He took his Masonry at Scottsbluff, became Master of his Lodge, Robert W. Furnas Lodge, and this is something that I think we should all note. That of the 50 years that he has been a Master Mason, Brother Ed has held his proficiency card 47 years of those 50. You can readily see that he is more than just a Grand Musician, he has been a splendid ritualist. Well, he has worked in many of the appendant bodies of Masonry. In Dome Rock Chapter, Order of Easter Star, he was their musician for 13 years. He was Worthy Patron for 2 years, he was the Grand Organist of the Grand Chapter, O.E.S., for two years. I don't know how many other times that he has played for all these bodies on special occasion.

There in Hastings we have two lodges and generally when they have the Masters degrees in either of them, they have Brother Ed over playing for them. In the Scottish Rite he is an Inspector General Honorary, 33°, that means he wears the white cap of our Scottish Rite. He has really served the York Rite for many years and has held many high positions in the York Rite. I will just briefly enumerate some of them. He has been a High Priest of Capitular Masonry, Master of Council of Cryptic Masonry. Commander of Grand Commandery and then on the Grand level, he has been a Grand Master of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masonry in Nebraska. He has been a charter member and sovereign of the Shiloh Conclave Red Cross of Constantine, a member of the Royal Order of Scotland and there are many other orders particularly in York Rite honors he has received because of his long service there and the many things he has done. He has been a catalyst in improving relations between the York Rite and the Scottish Rite. I love him for that. We all should hold him in esteem for many reasons, but that is enough.

He has been active in his church, has played as church organist, a Congregational, he has been a Trustee of his church, treasurer, and has been a devoted church man all through the years. Now I must get to the most important part of the man's life.

On Christmas Eve, December 24, 1982, the Lockwoods will be observing their 50th wedding anniversary, and I want to say this, that Olive has been an inspiration to Ed. She stood right by him, she has assisted him and has been with him all the way. I think that is marvelous and a part of the personality of both of them, which is radiant. They have a son who is a dentist at Hastings; they have a granddaughter who is 7 years of age and a grandson who is 4 years of age. I asked Ed, "How many individuals are you instructing in music now?" He has taught great numbers of people. He says there are only 4. One of them is my granddaughter, age 7. Can't you just see the Maestro Grandfather giving music lessons to 7-year-old Christian? "How about Matthew?" He says, "His time is coming." Well, there are many things you can say about Ed, but I wanted you to get this perspective of him; that he is more than a musician and we hold him in such high esteem because of his personality and his devotion to Masonry.

Now, in the Grand Lodge we have a prescribed ceremony for the presentation of the 50 year badge of Masonry. It was penned in 1960 by M. M. Brother Lewis E. Smith. It is a beautiful ceremony. I am just going to give some of the highlights. He prefaces the ceremony with a text from Scripture. It goes like this:

"For thou, O God, has heard my vows; thou has given me the heritage of those that fear Thy name." At this time, Olive, if you would stand. I would like to have you do the pinning.

FIFTY YEAR PIN PRESENTATION

W.: EDWARD H. LOCKWOOD

When I first started out after graduation from Nebraska Wesleyan, of course, music was my vocation. Shortly after that I got interested in Masonry, and you might say that Masonry is my avocation. In 1963, Olive said, well I just switched it. I made Masonry my vocation, and music my avocation. Music and Masonry has been my life. Though I belong to many of the appendant orders connected with the blue lodge of Masonry, I think that everyone can say that the Blue Lodge is my first love. I have attended a lot of meetings and I intend to attend more. Thanks, Herb, so much for this presentation. It means a lot to me to have had you do it. I like working for Scottish Rite and York Rite and Shrine, particularly the Blue Lodge. Thank you.

M.W. JAMES A. WILLIAMS, GRAND MASTER, GRAND LODGE, A. F. & A. M. OF ALASKA

M.:W.: Brother Byron, Grand Lodge officers, distinguished guests, brothers and ladies. We have a presentation in a rather light-hearted mood to make this evening. I have been in the limelight a couple of times already, so I am going to leave this up to John Ingram, Senior Grand Warden and the R.:W.: Grand Secretary. I want to warn you about this R.:W.: Brother Gunnar, he is getting more than his share of attention anyway, I really shouldn't let him participate. Don't pay too much attention to what he says. Most Secretaries, with the exception of course, of Brother Lallman, are hard to get along with after four or five years. Brother Gunnar has been a Secretary for about four months now and he is unbearable already. If the good brothers would approach and get their act together, I would appreciate it very much.

They raised over \$100,000 by selling this oil to visiting brethren. Some of us grabbed some for special purposes such as this. Our Grand Master, M : W : Jim, signed this and we make this presentation to you. So you don't forget, you got the first oil that traveled down this 800 mile pipeline. We have with us our Grand Historian, W. Glenn Pruett from Fairbanks, who with his crafty hands cut from the pipeline this piece of beauty that we present to you.

M. W. BYRON C. JENKINS, GRAND MASTER

My fellow Alaskans, this is beautiful and I will treasure it for years. Yes, I saw the scenic beauty on that marvelous airplane flight that you put me on, when all we saw was fog. I am coming back to see more of it, not the fog, but the land. W. Brother Pruett, this is beautiful, I appreciate it greatly. Thank you.

I would like to have M. W. Brother Norris W. Lallman approach the podium, please. M.W. Brother Norris has served the Grand Lodge for many years very capably. He has this year not accepted re-election; therefore, at our session this afteroon a resolution was passed. The brethren have heard it, but I am going to read it for the benefit of all present. "M.W. BROTHER Norris W. Lallman, having served this Grand Lodge, A.F.W. and A.M., for 6 years in its advancing line of officers, culminating in your year of Distinguished Service as Grand Master, accepting election as Grand Secretary, a service that has lasted for 12 faithful and devoted years; now, therefore, it is our desire that upon completion of the Installation of your successor tomorrow, June 13, 1981, that you be made Grand Secretary Emeriti." From the size of it, I think Paul Bunyan designed it. I think that Gunnar would even have trouble swinging it. This is a "Rock Maul." It has been used in a Rock Quarry for its intended purpose. It was presented to me by the 1966 Masters of the Omaha Lodges, with the thought that it is to be used as a trophy in this Grand Lodge. I am going to, this evening, present this trophy to the Lodge that I consider to be the best Lodge in the State of Nebraska, in my opinion based on the following measures: enthusiasm, officers, leadership, temple appearance, ritual, attendance, bulletin or newsletter, programs other than ritual, business meeting, attendance at Grand Lodge functions. Now wouldn't I be embarrassed if when I named these people, they weren't here? I know you want to know who receives this first. They will hold it for one year, and on the first day of the session next June, they will return this Rock Maul and then it will be presented by your Grand Master, who will be installed tomorrow, to the lodge he considers to be the best, by the previously stated qualifications. We hope that this Rock Maul will continue many, many years and encourage all lodges to improve themselves. If the Master and Wardens of Geneva Lodge No. 79, would all come up here, please.

THE GRAND ORATOR "Symbolically Speaking"

Robert E. Richards, Grand Orater:

Most Wortshipful Sir, Distinguished Guests, Past Grand Orators, and Ladies and Gentlemen:

For the third consecutive Annual Communication of our Great and Ancient Order, it is my duty and pleasure to address you on this occasion. Although they say "The third time is a charm," that has no application here, unless, of course, you are charmed by the fact that this is my last appearance before you in this capacity. At this time I would like to publicly thank the past three Grand Masters who have appointed me as their and your Grand Orator. Most Worshipful Sir, the Honorable Jack H. Hendrix; Most Worshipful Sir, Warren D. "Duke" Lichty; and your present Grand Master for approximately another fifteen hours, most Worshipful Sir, Byron C. Jenkins. I have considered this a great honor and privilege to serve as your Grand Orator and the Grand Orator of the Grand Lodge these past three years.

As I was thinking about what I wanted to say to you tonight, it came to me that probably the most important message I could bring you had to do with the reason why there must be something about the order which attracts men and makes them dedicated Masons, and the same is true of the Eastern Star. Sociability may be a factor, but that can be found in any other club, or on the golf course, or even on the street. Some may think it prestigious; still others may enjoy the Ritual. Or is it because of the spiritual uplift and because it is always a challenge that one can get more out of all the time? Is it because its lessons and teachings deal with the inner life, that home of the spirit where every person thinks the secret thoughts he never tells? To each man Masonry has its own personal meaning.

A good illustration of different meanings being attached to something is that story of the four travelers in a compartment on a train—a colonel, a sergeant, an old maid and her attractive niece. As the train entered a tunnel, there was a sound of a kiss, followed by a slap. The old maid thought the sergeant had kissed her niece and she had slapped him. The niece thought the colonel had kissed her old maid aunt and been slapped for his insolence. The colonel knew he'd been slapped, and he assumed that the sergeant had kissed the young lady and then ducked. Only the sergeant knew the real story. He knew he'd kissed the back of his hand and then slapped the colonel. Each of the four persons identified the symbols, but no two gave the same meaning to them. The same is true of Masonry we can identify the components, and to each they hold a different meaning.

In any explanation of our Craft, we may name the emblems or symbols by which it is taught, analyze them, interpret them and discuss the allegory, but their significance only has meaning in terms of experience. And since no two persons' experiences are ever exactly the same, each man will derive his own meaning.

The purpose of the hidden mysteries in Masonry is not to keep a brother in the dark, but to stimulate him to seek the light. The emblems or symbols do not conceal the teaching; they reveal it and in such a manner that he may find it for himself. Only when a man finds truth for himself, is he likely to keep it as a permanent possession. And only through Ritual, symbols and allegory does it delve into the deepest recesses of man's nature and give him the key by which he may unlock the door, behind which he finds the meaning for himself.

The construction of the beautiful Temple of Solomon furnishes one such instructive symbol of the growth and development of the character of individuals. The Temple was the wonder of its time, the greatest material achievement in the history of Israel—depicting our Craft's original and lofty purpose of building character, understanding and harmony. But stately and magnificent as it was, it but symbolized a grander and more wondrous Temple—the Temple of the human soul, a higher expression of creative skill. The human sould, however, possesses more resources of design. More intricate and wonderful harmonies are displayed in it. It is robed with more beauty and majesty, and it transcends it in nature. While the Temple of Solomon had to stand as it was built, the human soul can enlarge, enhance and beautify itself. The Temple of Solomon, magnificent as it was, was but a Temple built with hands, and, therefore, built only for time. But the Temple which that ancient and beautiful man-made structure symbolizes is immortal. The longer it lives, the more intensively it is capable of living.

If we are to develop our own glorious temples to their fullest potential, we must turn again and again to our ancient Grand Masters for guidance, and to the Sacred Book of the law for instruction, and view nature as a great Masonic Temple, with its broad trestleboard, upon which the Supreme Architect of the universe draws His designs and revelations of His Holy Will, which lead through nature, up to nature's god.

Those who study Freemasonry will see it a grand series of moral and philosophical dramas, eloquent and instructive, and will discern that the three degrees in our Blue Lodge embrace all of the possible circumstances of man—moral, spiritual and social. It's all in there. All one has to do is dig it out, and the deeper one delves into it, the more profound meaning he will find.

It is a combination of all the experiences of Masonry that make it what it is for each of us.

If you pull a flower to pieces, the petals and the perfume remain, but there is no rose. You can play isolated notes and sound is heard, but no music. Every word written by Milton, Shakespeare and other literary greats can be found in a dictionary, but these words by themselves do not make immortal poetry or prose. It is as a whole that it has meaning, otherwise, we merely pronounce words without rhyme, make a flower of wax, or a song muted.

REPORT ON THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

M. W. Grand Master: Your Committee on Codification of the Law respectfully submits its report as follows, relative to amendments to the By-Laws of this Grand Lodge at this communication:

Sec. 2-606 - FEES, MINIMUM RETURN — The minimum fees for the three degrees shall be forty dollars divided as follows: \$20.00 for the degree of an Entered Apprentice Mason, \$10.00 for the degree of a Fellow Craft mason and \$10.00 for the degree of Master Mason; the fee for the degree of an Entered Apprentice shall accompany the petition for initiation; and no degree shall be conferred on any person until the fee, as fixed by the by-laws as the date the candidate's petition was received, is actually paid, nor shall fees ever be refunded after the degrees are conferred. Fees paid in advance become the property of the lodge on a favorable ballot, and the secretary shall at once, upon receipt of any fee or other funds, pass the same into the funds of the lodge. They shall be returned to rejected petitioners and to candidates stopped by objection, but not to those who decline to submit to the regular mode of preparation. When fees have been paid for any of the degrees, and the candidate has been ready to receive them but dies without receiving them, the fees shall be refunded to his estate. No lodge shall impose a fee for admission or demission, provided, however, that in any case where application for admission is presented by a brother to a lodge in which the fees are higher than those charged by the lodge issuing such demit, the lodge to which application

for admission is made, may require that the brother pay to it such difference in fees, or any part thereof, that the lodge may elect.

"In addition to the fees set forth above, each candidate for the degrees shall, prior to the time of taking his degree as a Master Mason, pay the additional sum of five dollars for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association. Each subordinate lodge shall pay all such sums to the Grand Lodge at the time of making its other annual payments, and the Grand Lodge shall remit the sums so collected on an annual basis to the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association." Motion carried.

We move that a new section be added to the By-Laws of this Grand Lodge as follows in Chapter VII, Property:

Sec. 2-709 - OWNERSHIP OF JEWELS — Effective with the adoption of this by-law, the Past Grand Master's Jewels and the Gold Jordan Medal shall be and remain the property of the Grand Lodge, and shall be returned to the Grand Lodge upon the death of the wearer. The name of each wearer shall be perpetuated on the Past Grand Master's Jewel. Motion carried.

THE ROLL OF DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS AND DATE OF APPOINTMENT

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian," was made in 1869.

In 1870 the "Committee on Work" recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. these together with the Grand Lecturer to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have at any time served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was or is a member.

Note: From 1880 until 1910, there were no recorded appointments of brethren to serve as assistants to the Grand Custodian. In 1910 Brother Robert E. French did hold special meetings to examine and instruct brethren who were willing to become "assistants" in the work. Thirteen brethren were nominated and approved for appointment as assistants. After 1917 these brethren were generally referred to as "assistant custodians". In 1925 the designation was "Deputy Custodians". The following brethren appeared in the records as "assistant custodians" or at times as "Deputy Custodians."

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence their era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A. L.) "In the year of light."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, Anno Inventionis (A, ., L, .) "In the year of the Discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the Temple of Solomon was completed, Anno Depositions (A. . Dep. .) "In the year of the deposit."

Knight Templar commence their era with the organization of the order, Anno Ordinis, (A. O.) "In the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchizedek, Anno Beneficio, (A. Beo.) "In the year of the blessing."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used. Anno Mundi, (A. M.) "In the year of the world."

RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

Ancient Craft Masons – Add 4,000 years to the current year, thus: 1981 and 4,000 - 5981.

Royal Arch Masons — Add 530 to the current year, thus: 1981 and 530-2509.

Royal and Select Masters – Add 1,000 years to current year, thus: 1975 and 1,000 - 2981.

Knights Templar – From the Christian era take 1,118; thus: 1,118 from 1981 – 860.

Order of High Priesthood – To the Christian era add 1913, the year of the blessing, thus 1981 - 3891.

Scottish Rite - Add 3,760 to the current year; thus 1981 and 3,760 - 5939.
