

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
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

Served as Worshipful Master in 1970 and 1980.

Re-appointed Grand Marshal in June 1987 by M∴W∴ Wayne G. Luenenborg. Re-appointed Grand Marshal in February 1988 by M∴W∴ Paul R. Eveland. Re-appointed Grand Marshal in February 1989 by M∴W∴ Thomas W. Tye. Re-appointed Grand Marshal in February 1990 by M∴W∴ John M. McHenry. Re-appointed Grand Marshal in February 1991 by M∴W∴ James N. DeMoss. Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in February 1992 by M∴W∴ James L. Eatmon. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in February 1993 by M∴W∴ Donald L. Pohlman. Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-Elect under M∴W∴ V. Kaye Ramsey in February 1996. Installed as 131st Grand Master of Masons on February 8, 1997.

Served the Grand Lodge as a Deputy Grand Custodian for 7 years. Commissioned Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Sweden on June 12, 1987. Served on numerous Grand Lodge Committees.



Dual member with McCook Lodge No. 135, McCook, Nebraska. Served as Master of McCook Lodge No. 135 in 1984.

Grand Lodge — Appointed Grand Senior Steward in February 1988 by M∴W∴ Paul R. Eveland. Re-appointed Grand Senior Steward in February 1989 by M∴W∴ Thomas W. Tye. Appointed Grand Secretary Pro-Tem in September 1989 by M∴W∴ Thomas W. Tye. Elected and installed as Grand Secretary in February 1990, and served through November 1992. Appointed Grand Orator in November 1992 by M∴W∴ James L. Eatmon. Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in February 1993 by M∴W∴ Donald L. Pohlman. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in February 1994 by M∴W∴ Steven F. Matton. Elected and installed as Grand Junior Warden under M∴W∴ Jerry L. Rittenburg in February 1995. Elected and installed Grand Senior Warden under M∴W∴ V. Kaye Ramsey in February 1996. Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-Elect under M∴W∴ Kenneth G. Fleming in February 1997. Installed as the 132nd Grand Master of Masons on February 15, 1998.

Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Gabon. Previously served on Fraternal Relations Committee and as an ex-officio member of the Grand Lodge Office Committee.

York Rite — Made a Royal Arch Mason in King Cyrus Chapter No. 35, at McCook, Nebraska on November 15, 1985, and served as High Priest in 1989. Made a Royal and Select Master in Occonoxee Council No. 16, at McCook, Nebraska on December 7, 1985, and served as Illlustrious Master in 1991. Dubbed a Knight Templar in St. John Commandery No. 16, at McCook, Nebraska on December 7, 1985, and served as Eminent Commander in 1990. Received the Knights of the York Cross of Honor (KYCH) on August 29, 1992. Inducted into Red Cross of Constantine on August 27, 1994.

Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite — Received the 4th through the 32nd Degrees in the Valley of Hastings, Orient of Nebraska on October 26, 1978. Elected a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor (KCCH) in December 1997.

Shrine — Member since 1979 of Tehama Temple of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine in Hastings, Nebraska. Served as Treasurer in 1996 and Trustee in 1997-98. Charter member of the Legion of Honor, joining on June 6, 1997.

Order of Eastern Star—Initiated in Sylvia Chapter No. 80 at Genoa, Nebraska on May 4, 1962. Member of Acacia Chapter No. 39 in Hastings, Nebraska, served as Worthy Patron in 1974 and 1997.

Rainbow for Girls — Awarded the Grand Cross of Color by the International Order of Rainbow for Girls in 1984.

Other Masonic Bodies — Member of Omaha Chapter No. 19, National Sojourners, Royal Order of Jesters Court No. 152, York Rite College No. 173, Tehama Greeters, Hillbillies, and Camel Herders.

Military Service — Retired from the United States Army as Sergeant; serving from 1952 to 1954.

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





GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD

M∴W∴ Grand Master Fleming made the following remarks as he presented the 1997 Grand Master's Humanitarian Award recipient:

"We have some stringent criteria that we have established for recognition of these individuals. First of all, we will not award this to more than two individuals in any calendar year. The individual that is entitled to receive this award, and there are many, ... must be a Master Mason and have been such for at least 30 years. He must have been active in at least three of the five following community activities: he could have held a political office such as mayor, city council member, county board member, NRD member, school board member, some other political office, whatever might be available where he resides; he could have been active in his church, either as an elder, a vestryman, deacon, lay

leader, lay reader, whatever his particular denomination permits; he could have been denoted as a civic leader because of his involvement on boards of directors for local hospitals, nursing homes, financial institutions, or foundations; he could have been a volunteer for such charitable organizations as the Y, United Way, Scouting, or similar organizations. He could have been involved in such service organizations as Lions, Sertoma, Kiwanis, Rotary, Optimists, and so forth. But lastly, he must have been active in the Masonic fraternity. In other words, these are the Masons that make the difference within their community. These awards are presented to them in their local community, and the entire community is invited to be present, particularly those organizations with which they have been involved. This year it was our pleasure to present this award to Worshipful Brother Ralph E. Townsend of Camp Clarke Lodge No. 285 and Scotts Bluff Lodge No. 201; and Willard M. Rouze of Purity Lodge No. 198.

ROCK MAUL AWARD

M : W : C Grand Master Fleming described the Rock Maul Award as one that is presented to one lodge each year by the Grand Master. The lodge selected should represent the best all around lodge in the jurisdiction of Nebraska. The Rock Maul is a sixteen pound rock maul that has been used in a rock quarry for its intended purpose. It was inscribed and presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in the year of M : W : D Byron C. Jenkins (1980), and has been awarded once a year since then to that lodge determined to have been the recipient by the selection process. The recipient of the Award is unknown until this announcement at Grand Lodge each year. The Grand Master presented the Rock Maul Award to Craftsmen Lodge No. 314.

GRAND ORATION

Keith Barrett, Craftsmen Lodge No. 314

Most Worshipful Grand Master Fleming, Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters and visiting Grand Masters, other visiting Masonic dignitaries, Brethren, and friends:

I think one of the first things any speaker likes to do is establish a little credibility. Give the audience a reason why they ought to listen to this person. As I consider credibility, I am reminded of a true story which happened many years ago on an airplane, involving Miss Roselyn Russell, whom most of you will remember, a great actress of stage and screen of vesterday. Miss Russell was seated next to a man with a terrible cold. He was hacking, coughing, sneezing, eyes watering, nose running; Miss Russell turned to him and said, "Pardon me sir, I think if you will just take two aspirin, drink plenty of liquid, and get a good nights sleep, tomorrow you will feel better." He failed to acknowledge her expert advice. She was perturbed with him. He continued to cough and sneeze, so by and by she turned to him again and she said, "Sir, if you will take my advice, drink plenty of liquid, get plenty of rest, take two aspirin right away, tomorrow you are bound to feel better." Again he failed to acknowledge her advice, so more than a little perturbed she turned to him and said, "Well, perhaps I should introduce myself, I am Roselyn Russell, I make movies." He said, "Oh really, I am Charles Mayo, I have a clinic."

A few years ago I spoke at a Chamber of Commerce banquet down in Pahokee, Florida. Now you know folks, Pahokee is a really nice place on the eastern shore of Lake Okeechobee, about 60 miles west of West Palm Beach. Not the easiest place in the world to get to. In fact it took me the better part of a day to get from Lincoln, Nebraska to Pahokee, Florida. When I finally got there I got a room in the local motel, took a shower, shaved, and stretched out on the bed for a little nap so I would be fresh for the banquet that night. There on the night stand was

a little phamplet entitled "Things to do in Pahokee." I opened it up and read, "You are doing it baby!"

We have a great happening here in beautiful Kearney, Nebraska today with the 141st Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. I am tickled pink to be here for two reasons. Number one it has been a great pleasure to serve as Grand Orator under a Most Worthy and Most Special Grand Master during this year just passed. It is doubly delightful to be asked by the Deputy Grand Master to serve one more term. I think Don is going to give me another year to get it right. The second reason I am so glad to be here is that this past December 7, I celebrated my 70th birthday. An interesting thing happens when you go past 70. Everything begins to click, neck, back, elbows, knees, everything clicks. This is the time of life where everything I have seems to wear out, spread out, or fall out. Everything I like to do hurts.

My friends, two of the biggest thrills I have had in over 40 years of platform speaking, was when on two different occasions, I had the pleasure of working with Mr. Paul Harvey. Most recently was down at the beautiful Lake of the Ozarks, at the Missouri Hospital Association. My task was to do a breakfast for the American College of Hospital Administrators, about 700 for breakfast. Paul Harvey did the Grand Convention wrap-up, speaking to more than 1500. My host, the association executive had been so very gracious. He had given me a complimentary ticket to the luncheon, and seated me next to Paul Harvey. For the better part of an hour I got to visit with Mr. Harvey — up close and personal. I don't know how you feel about him, but I have always admired him. I want to tell you friends, he is electric, he is dynamic! There is an aura about him that just consumes you. At that time, his professional fee was \$32,000 a talk, which is something more than I get for my gigs. Anyway, the person who was in charge of the program, perhaps making it up to me for some of the disparity, had most erroneously listed me on the printed program as Dr. Keith Barrett, PHD, JD, CPA, CLU and CPC. Now here is old Keith Barrett, the only guy in the history of Wichita North to be president of his senior class two years in a row. With all of these professional designations I want to tell you I was proud of that printed program. I took a copy of it for my wife to look over, because more and more frequently she is forgetting to applaud when I come down to breakfast. She is one of these gals who thinks that love, honor and obey is a multiple choice question. I was watching a basketball game on television the other day, when she walked into the den and asked, "Has the excitement gone out of our marriage?" I told her, "We would talk about it during a commercial."

My wife, Evelyn does not typically come along with me when I speak around the country. She doesn't care what I do when I am gone, just as long as I don't enjoy it. She dropped me off at the Lincoln Airport the other day and just as I got out of her car I asked, "How many top after- dinner speakers you think there are in the world today?" She said, "One less than you think." I am kidding you of course. She is one super grand fine human being, my bride of 47 years. I remember when I proposed to her down in Wichita, Kansas a long time ago. I said, "I love you Evelyn and I know I am not much to look at." She said, "That's alright, you will be at work most of the time."

Well my friends, we have laughed here for a few minutes, but balance is important. I want to talk with you seriously for just a few minutes about success. What is this mysterious, marvelous elusive called success? I love what Albert Herbert said many years ago, "What is the secret of success? The secret of success is this, there is no secret of success." Other definitions might be the achievement of something desired, planned or attempted. Another definition—an affordable or satisfactory outcome or result, the gaining of wealth, fame, rank, prestige, etc. Synonyms for success might be achievement, luck, consummation, prosperity, victory.

If we had a high powered seminar leader in here with us this morning, he or she might tell us that success is the progression of realization of predetermined goals or objectives. You can't argue with that. I like to believe something that Christopher Morley said three hundred years ago, "There is only one success, to be able to spend your life in your own way." I don't have a crystal ball. I am not good at predicting the future and I am always very suspect of these people who have the surefire formulas for success. What may work for you may not work for me, and vice versa. Each of us have our own individual uniqueness, and this is important. You are individually and uniquely made; you are one of a kind; there is nobody else exactly like you. This little speciality that you are makes you very special. For that reason I think there is no surefire formula for success. There is only one way to the good life, and that is your way. Trying to find success, whatever that means to you; trying to find fulfillment by whatever way that may mean, by the way that is truly your way. A way that makes you feel good in your bones, as they can be just as frustrating and just as disastrous as not really trying at all. When I talk about having it your way, this is not a cop-out. I believe as surely as I am standing here that everyone in this room, all of us all have within us everything we need to be at least twice as good as we are. No matter how great a job you are doing in the Masonic Family, you can do it at least twice as well. You can be two times as good a parent, twice as good a spouse, you can enjoy your lives at least twice as much. You have within you everything you need. Experts in human behavior tell us that we are all operating on a very fractional part of our potential. I find it more credible to believe that I can be at least twice as good as I am. I'll tell you the truth. I am twice as good a speaker as I was 20 years ago. I know a lot of you are thinking, you must have been bad. I am improving, if I live for another 20 years I will be at least twice as good. I haven't given this speech in at least 20 years.

We are all brought up in the belief that the secret of success is hard work. Yet all around you, you see people who work hard who aren't successful. At the same time we see some people who don't seem to do much at all who are enormously successful by just about any standard. This is a pretty convincing argument that the real secret of success is not just hard work, although in most cases it definitely is a requirement. Over 50 years ago a gentleman who was a legend in the life insurance industry, named Dr. Albert Gray, prepared a paper for the national meeting of the million dollar round table members. His topic was the common denominator of success. He did a voluminous amount of research, wading through all sorts of biographies and autobiographies of suc-

cessful people. He came to the realization that it wasn't so much what these people did, but what made them do it. What was the common thread that wove through all of the lives of these people who had known success. After doing all this research, he came to this simple conclusion, "The common denominator of success was just simply this, that successful people had formed the habit of doing the things that failures don't like to do." You say that is too elementary, too simple, but you can hold it up to the light, put it to an acid test, kick it around, and it is still a common denominator of success. People form habits and habits form futures. If we don't deliberately set out to form good habits, habits that are going to work for us, we unconsciously form bad habits; habits that are going to work against us. Have you ever wondered why it is that people who seem to be the very best at what they are doing seem to enjoy these little tasks that you and I don't like to do. The fact is they don't. They don't like to do them any better than you or I. If they don't like to do them then why do they do them? Because by doing the things that they don't like to do, they can attain the results that they want to attain. You might say therefore, it follows that successful people are motivated by a desire for results. Failures on the other hand are motivated by a desire for pleasing methods. They are content to live with second best all their lives just because they are doing things within their comfort zone.

We are all motivated by very different stimulus. One of my favorite stories about motivation happened many years ago on a Saturday night. This is out of deference to Dale Anderson, our resident rancher. This young man who lived on a ranch had a big problem. He was late getting in from the field on a Saturday evening, and he knew that if he went around this pasture which was between his house and his girlfriends house that he would be even later and run the risk of her going on to the dance without him. He knew at the same time if he went through this pasture he might be confronted with 1500 pounds of big, bad bull. He pondered his options and decided that the prize was worth the risk. He started through the pasture at a nice easy lope so that he would not arouse the attention of this bull. He was getting along famously for about 75% through the field when all of a sudden without previous warning, he felt bull breath on his heels. Dale Anderson could probably tell you that there are few things in this life more terrifying than having bull breath on your heels. He quickened his pace. Needless to say, he was running the 100 yard dash at the rate of about 10 flat. Unfortunately, the bull was running at 9.8. He envisioned himself being gored and trampled to death by this big, bad and now very angry bull, but alas a ray of hope. In front of him about 20 yards was a sturdy oak tree with a substantial limb about 10 or 12 feet above ground. Marshalling all his strength and with one mighty surge of adrenalin he made a mightly leap for that limb. Unfortunately he missed it but fortunately, he caught it coming down, and so it is with life. If I want to be a Master Mason; if I want to carry the mail; whatever I want to do in life or in this great Masonic family, I want to be sufficiently motivated, sufficiently enthusiastic about it to where if I happen to miss a few things on the way up, I'm still going to be in a position to catch them on the way down.

I didn't come here to the podium this morning to tell any of you how to do your jobs, how to live your lives, how to serve. That is the farthest thing from my

mind. In fact everyone in this room is my superior in some way. That doesn't mean I have a poor opinion of myself, it is just a fact of life. You do some things better than I, I do some things better than you. You are as good as I, I am as good as you. We can respect each other, and this mutual respect we have for each other is to our mutual benefit. I love the way Jay Beacroft who was the legendary trainer for 3M for so many years, said this way back before we had inclusive language ladies so I am going to paraphrase it. "I never met a person who couldn't do some things better than I. At the same time I never met a person I couldn't do some things better than he or she." What is Mr. Beacroft saying? He is saying "Hey baby, you are somebody, I am somebody and you're capable of being a super somebody and so am I." Even more importantly he is saying, you can't place someone else's head above yours without losing some of your own precious self respect. You do some things better than I, I do some things better than you. You are as good as I, I am as good as you, but together we can get the job done. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska and the entire Masonic family is a viable entity. What does it take to make this fraternity the very best the world has ever known? All it really takes is just a few people like yourselves who are enthusiastic, willing to make a commitment to a concept of excellence that only a fraction of the people are willing to commit themselves to. You are enthusiastic, bubbling all over, wide of range if you please, and I love the way Helen Homer said it in a little musical drama entitled. For Heavens Sake. From within the score there is song with these lyrics: "One man awake can awaken another, the second can waken his next door brother, the three awake can arouse a whole town, turning the place upside down. The many awake can make such a fuss, that it finally awakens the rest of us. One man up with dawn in his eyes, multiplies. This would be the crux of my message. Brothers and Sisters let's go out and multiply. You have been a great audience, God Bless you.

R : W : Reginald S. Kuhn declared a quorum present for the transaction of business.

The report of the Committee on Business and Rules was made by the R:W: Grand Secretary Reginald S. Kuhn, who then moved for its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

Reginald S. Kuhn, 19 & 134

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge. The Committee further recommends:

- 1. The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures.
- 2. Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.
- 3. Amendments, which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.
- 4. Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other brothers may speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.
- 5. No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.
- 6. Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated limits.
- 7. When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decision and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the Committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak. Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time permitting, other brothers may speak after which a vote will be taken.
- 8. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret ballot or other method at his discretion.

9. Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The motion was seconded and passed.

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M : W : Kenneth G. Fleming announced the appointment of M : W : Thomas W. Tye as Parliamentarian for this 141st Annual Communication.

M : W : Kenneth G. Fleming then appointed the Deputy Grand Custodians as Tellers for this session with W : Steven A. Green as Chairman.

Election of Officers

Most Worshipful Grand Master Fleming directed that the delegates cast their ballots for the election of the offices of Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden and Grand Secretary. All ballots were then collected by the tellers.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

John D. VerMaas, 256

Most Worshipful Grand Master Ken, and members of the body, this is a preliminary report of the Appropriations Committee. We did meet on December 15 at the Grand Lodge Office in Lincoln, Nebraska. I would like to give you what we are projecting for the budget for the coming year. Total Revenue \$427,913.10, expenses are \$427,235.14 leaving a balance of \$677.96. The committee has also recommended to present a resolution for a \$1.00 increase. I would just like to say that when we talk about a \$1.00 increase, it is four years down the road before we can get it. It would be read at this Grand Lodge, voted on at next year's session, if it passes it takes another year to collect it, and the following year before it can be used, so that is only 25 cents a year. We have to present a balanced budget; we are trying to stay ahead of it. Some of you may remember a few years ago we presented budgets that were not balanced for a couple of years. So, hopefully we will have enough to sign the resolution and it will be adopted next year.

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While awaiting the result of the election of officers the M.W. Doysa L. Whitaker, Grand Master of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraka brought greetings.

REPORT OF THE MASONIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Dennis Brydl, 287 & 314

In January of 1997, the Nebraska Grand Lodge Education Committee made a commitment to develop a vehicle to promote Masonic Education in Nebraska, to develop a single Masonic Education contact in each subordinate lodge and to develop a home page on the World Wide Web for the Nebraska Grand Lodge. The committee has met several times this year. Sub-committees have been created and they have been meeting frequently. In a follow-up meeting of the strategic planning session held in January of 1997, the committee found that they are on track to accomplish their objectives.

At Grand Lodge, the Education Committee will be giving out samples of a pamphlet called "To Light." The cost of sending this publication to each Mason in Nebraska would be cost prohibitive, so for the present, the Grand Lodge Education Committee will be selling subscriptions to members to recover part of the cost of the document. The cost of printing and sending this publication to each member is beyond the committee's budget. The committee hopes that after seeing the value of "To Light" in increasing the Masonic knowledge of the craft, an allocation will be asked for on the annual dues to pay for the postage and printing. This year, individual Masons, or lodges will be asked to pay a meager \$5 per year for a subscription. The committee has gotten several volunteers to generate articles and will publish two releases a year.

Early this fall, all subordinate lodges were asked to submit a name of a member that would serve as a Masonic Education contact. This person will be responsible to see that all information sent to the subordinate lodge is given to the members. This Mason could set up Masonic Education programs based on information given to them by the Education Committee or other sources (Short Talk Bulletins, To Light, etc.).

Also at Grand Lodge, the Education Committee will be giving a demonstration of a web page that will be made active in the first quarter of 1998. This web page will begin rather simple, but will grow as the expertise increases and more time becomes available. The internet is a powerful tool that the Grand Lodge cannot ignore. Lodges with computers, or members who have computers will eventually be able to communicate with the Grand Lodge rather than use the mail or having to stop in the office. The Grand Lodge Office Committee has given approval to purchase a PC that will serve as the internet connection between the Grand Lodge Office and the internet. The committee has enlisted the help of many Masons who have experience in building a web site.

The Education Committee re-wrote "The Duties of the Investigating Committee" pamphlet and it has been sent to all subordinate lodges. The "A Word to the Candidate" is being worked on at this time. The Grand Lodge Education Committee has enlisted the help of many people to accomplish these endeavors

During the past year Brethren, 634 members of our fraternity have passed to their just reward and entered that undiscovered country. We are assembled here in observance of the 141st Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and as we enjoy the fellowship which such an occasion makes

possible, it seems only fitting that we pause for a few moments to honor the memory of those who served their lodges so faithfully and well, and who have been called from their labors here on earth to the great beyond. Among those Brethren whom we today remember are three Past Grand Masters who gave of their time unselfishly to promote the purposes and objectives of Masonry in Nebraska. They are Most Worshipful Brother Frank J. Mattoon who served as Grand Master in 1973, Most Worshipful Brother Herbert A. Ronin who served as Grand Master in 1961 and Most Worshipful Brother Louis V. Sylvester who served as Grand Master in 1965. As a fitting tribute to all of our departed Brethren, I would like to read a poem written by Brother Vern Lyons, a Nebraska Mason.

A Tribute To A Brother Mason

Here lies a Brother Mason His long days work is through He spent his life laying cornerstones for a better place for me and you.

We wish to report that all Grand Lodge Officers are present as well as 17 Past Grand Masters and 22 Deputy Grand Custodians.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

Charles W. Amidon, 281 & 327, Chairman

On July 1, 1997, the Chairman of the committee together with the Grand Custodian, met with the Master of Craftsmen Lodge No. 314 A.: F.: & A.: M.: to review the arrangements which had been made for the One-Day Class to be held on Saturday, July 12 in Lincoln, Nebraska.

On July 12, 1997 a One-Day Class was held at the Scottish Rite Cathedral in Lincoln which proved to be very successful when 53 new Masons were raised.

On September 26, 1997, the committee was represented at the Annual Deputy Custodian School held at Grand Island and participated in some of the ritual presentation.

On October 11, 1997, a One-Day Class was also held at Alliance, Nebraska where 21 candidates were raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason.

At the request of the Grand Master, a guideline has been prepared to assist subordinate lodges in conducting future One-Day Classes. As each lodge building throughout the state possesses a unique floor plan, it was impossible to diagram a fixed floor work layout. Therefore, the guideline is confined to such items as:

Advanced plans for processing new petitions
Collection of all fees in advance
Pre-planning of Degree presentations
Selection of Degree teams well in advance
Appointment of extra workers other than Degree presentation
Necessity of rehearsal sessions
Time scheduling for degrees and proficiency instruction

The Committee wishes to thank the Grand Custodian and the Grand Lodge office staff for their total cooperation in organizing and conducting the One-Day Classes held this past year.

M : W : Charles Amidon moved for the adoption of the report of the Committee on Nebraska Work as printed beginning on Page 6 in the Annual Reports packet. The motion was seconded and carried favorably.

M.: W.: Amidon then spoke on the following issue:

I would like to present an item for consideration this morning to help heal a problem we have had for the last 3 or 4 years. All of the delegates are aware that we have been conducting one-day degrees throughout the state of Nebraska — some in small groups of 3, 4 or 5 and some as many as 100. Brethren, unfortunately Section 1-1202 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws actually prohibits such action on behalf of any lodge or group of lodges. The Grand Masters unwittingly, and I was probably at fault when I was Grand Master, assumed that when the Grand Lodge is not in session, then the Grand Master is the Grand Lodge and can make any decision he so chooses. It has been determined by the Jurisprudence Committee that is not necessarily so, that his omnipotent decisions can be made only in regard to executive decisions, administrative decisions, they cannot overrule legislative or judicial rules that are in the book. In

order to help solve this situation and make it much clearer for all of the delegates and Grand Masters to come, I would like to propose the following bylaw amendment.

The existing bylaw reads, "Section 2-1202 — NUMBER OF CANDIDATES — No subordinate lodge shall enter, pass, or raise more than one candidate at the same time, but the lecture and charge may be given jointly to any number; provided, however, nothing in this section shall limit the number of candidates for the second section of the Fellow Craft Degree."

I propose that the words "without the prior written approval of the Grand Master" be added, so that the bylaw would then read, "Section 2-1202 — NUMBER OF CANDIDATES — No subordinate lodge shall enter, pass, or raise more than one candidate at the same time, without the prior written approval of the Grand Master, but the lecture and charge may be given jointly to any number; provided, however, nothing in this section shall limit the number of candidates for the second section of the Fellow Craft Degree."

This is an issue that is going to have to be solved some day, and it has been thoroughly explained to the delegates in the workshop on the problem we now have and therefore I would now ask for unanimous consent to consider this issue immediately.

Grand Master Fleming asked for unanimous consent to vote on this proposal at this time.

Unanimous consent failed.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

"My brethren, all of the delegates were furnished forty-five days before the opening of Grand Lodge, back in late December, a copy of the Grand Master's Recommendations, and as you registered you were given the final printed copy of my address. I would like to highlight just a few things, and go from there. Hearing no objection to that, we will proceed in that regard."

The printed address of the Grand Master is as follows:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

TO THE MOST ANCIENT AND HONORABLE FRATERNITY OF FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA

My Brethren:

In accordance with Article X, Section 2(b) of the Constitution of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, I do hereby submit my written address to this 141st Annual Communication. This address will consist of a record of my official acts, my thoughts on the general condition of Masonry in the Grand Jurisdiction of Nebraska, and recommenda-

tions for legislation that I believe to be necessary or expedient for the welfare of our fraternity. In accordance with Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge, all Grand Master's recommendations contained within this address were submitted to the Jurisprudence Committee, all Grand Lodge Officers, and to the Masters of all subordinate Lodges not less than forty-five days prior to this Annual Communication.

I first wish to express to every Mason within the jurisdiction of Nebraska, my sincere appreciation for allowing me to serve as your Grand Master for the last year. Having served Masonry in many capacities since being raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in 1957, I was well prepared to assume the honor of serving as your Grand Master. However, without the assistance and advice of all of the Grand Lodge Officers serving with me, as well as the wise counsel of my many friends and brothers who have served as Grand Masters before me, my year would have been much more difficult.

To each of the visiting dignitaries from other jurisdictions and from within the State of Nebraska, we offer a sincere welcome. We hope that your time here is as enjoyable as we experienced when visiting you.

To the delegates and other members attending the 141st Annual Communication, we extend a welcome as you gather to consider serious matters concerning your Grand Lodge. I hope that you and your wives will enjoy the workshops and banquets. We have planned the several sessions of Grand Lodge to promote the dignity and solemnity of the ancient and honorable craft and at the same time, have planned some of the events to promote an atmosphere of relaxation and good fellowship.

I owe special thanks to our Grand Lodge office staff, Chris Rudder, Carol Schroeder and Jean Holt who provide the day-to-day expertise that makes the Grand Lodge function so well.

NECROLOGY

As of the writing of this address, the Secretaries of our subordinate lodges have reported to the Grand Lodge Office that 551 of our brethren have entered into that House not made with Hands, Eternal in the Heavens. Their contributions to Masonry will leave fond memories.

We were saddened over the loss of three of our esteemed Past Grand Masters. Frank J. Mattoon who served as Grand Master in 1973 left us on July 4, 1997. November 4, 1997 we lost Herbert A. Ronin who served as Grand Master in 1961. Then, on December 4, 1997 we lost Louis V. Sylvester who served as Grand Master in 1965. This is a tremendous loss not only to those of us who knew them well, but the entire Masonic Fraternity.

The Committee on Fraternal Dead, under the able leadership of our V :: W :: Grand Chaplain Eugene C. Sibley, will be presenting a suitable tribute to our departed brethren as an important part of this Annual Communication.

Kaye Ramsey appointed a Trial Commission to conduct a Masonic Trial in a matter involving Liberty Lodge No. 300 and a member of that lodge. Trial was held on January 25, 1997 on this matter. Findings of the commission were that the individual was guilty as charged. It was the judgment of the Commission that the individual be expelled from Masonry. Pursuant to Section 3-802 of the Bylaws, an appeal to the findings of the Trial Commission

was filed with the Grand Secretary. After review of the proceedings of the Trial Commission, I submitted a copy of the appeal to the Committee on Grievances for review. After review of the findings of the Trial Commission and after receipt of the findings and recommendations of the Committee on Grievances, I denied the appeal and upheld the judgment and sentence of the Trial Commission.

On January 10, 1997, pursuant to the authority delineated in Section 1-301 of the Bylaws, M. W. V. Kaye Ramsey appointed a Trial Commission to conduct a Masonic Trial in a matter involving Centennial Lodge No. 326 and a member of that lodge. Trial was held on May 20, 1997 in this matter. Findings of the Commission were that the individual was guilty as charged. It was the judgment of the Commission that the individual be expelled from Masonry.

GRAND MASTER'S CONFERENCE

The Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held in Tulsa, Oklahoma on February 16-18, 1997. This conference offers the one forum for all Grand Masters to meet together as a body for discussion and sharing of ideas. Since each Grand Jurisdiction is sovereign, no binding legislative action can take place. However, the conference is attended by virtually every Grand Jurisdiction in North America and by many guest jurisdictions from all over the world.

I was asked to present a paper on Grand Lodge publications at the conference, with emphasis on a periodic publication. While many jurisdictions publish a monthly or quarterly paper similar to our "Nebraska Mason," all present were impressed with the efficiency of our office staff to do so without the support of paid advertisements, and at an economically feasible cost. Many jurisdictions asked me to send them a copy of our Lodge Officers Directory. Again many had such a publication, but lacked the range and detail of information in ours.

This year's Conference was attended by an unusually large number of guest jurisdictions from Europe and the Middle East. The Grand Master of Russia, whose Grand Lodge has recently emerged from exile was there, as were the Grand Masters of Iran and Iraq. Seldom is there an occasion for leaders of organizations from around the world to meet in such harmony and goodwill, a true example of the universality of Masonry.

MIDWEST CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS AND GRAND SECRETARIES

This year, the Midwest Conference of Grand Masters was held in Winnipeg, Canada, August 15-17, 1997. Attending with me was Deputy Grand Master Don Rasmussen and Grand Senior Warden Dwight Smith. Since many of the Midwest jurisdictions are going to the Office Manager concept for the Grand

Lodge office, Office Managers are invited to participate in the Conference with the Grand Secretaries; therefore Chris Rudder also attended. This meeting offers a good forum for discussion of problems and goals common to our Midwest area.

Next year, Nebraska will be responsible for the program. Much interest was shown in our Masonic All-Star Marching Band and it was suggested that R : W : Don Rasmussen include that in the 1998 program.

APPENDANT AND AFFILIATED BODIES

In the last few years, as a Grand Lodge Officer and especially during my term as Grand Master, I have sensed a growing unity and cooperation among all of our appendant bodies and Blue Lodge Masonry. As an officer and member of Grand Lodge, which consists of the Masters and Wardens of all of our lodges, as well as all Past Grand Masters and Grand Lodge Officers, it is our responsibility to preserve our great Masonic heritage, passed down to us from ages past, to keep our foundation strong and our roots healthy; while at the same time keeping Masonry a viable force in the future of mankind. Some of the greatest traditions of Masonry are charity to our fellow man, based on our belief of the brotherhood of man, and our kindred sonship with our Heavenly Father. We like to point out that Masonry donates over a million dollars a day to charitable causes, and we do, mostly through programs sponsored by York Rite, Scottish Rite, Shrine, Eastern Star and their many auxiliary organizations. On my many visitations to the meetings of our appendant groups, the thing I found most noticeable and which was repeated over and over was their respect and love of basic Blue Lodge Masonry. In many ways our appendant bodies are the means by which our Masonic goals are carried out in the world. Nowhere was this more evident than during my visit to the Imperial Shrine session held in St. Louis, Missouri last July. This visit was made possible for my wife and me through the hospitality of our three Nebraska Shrine Temples, a visit made even more memorable because a Past Master of Hickman Lodge No. 256, Illustrious Sir John D. VerMaas, was presiding as Imperial Potentate.

All of our appendant and affiliated bodies provide support for our many Grand Lodge programs. I strongly encourage all of my brother Masons to participate in carrying the Masonic message of Brotherhood, Dignity, Human Rights, Freedom and Charity, to the rest of the world by becoming associated with our brothers in the appendant bodies, if you have the opportunity.

CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

1. Membership

By the most current report it appears that our membership has suffered a net loss of 606 members leaving a total membership of 18,899. The final number for 1996 was 19,505. Our loss from death in 1997 was 551. While our loss from

death is beyond our control, there was still a disturbing loss of 513 because of suspension for non-payment of dues. As I write this, the month of December is still unreported. Requests for reinstatements are still coming in and there will undoubtedly be a few more Master Masons raised, so I'm confident the final number will be a little better.

As I said, we have no control over our losses due to death. The average age of our membership makes it inevitable that those losses will be high. We are making gains in the numbers of new members and as this gain continues to lower our average age, our loss due to death will be a smaller percentage of our total membership. Loss due to non-payment of dues continues to be a focus of your Grand Lodge. The Committees on Education, Membership, and Public Relations will be charged to focus their efforts on this problem. One of the end results of the cooperation among these committees should be an improvement in membership retention.

2. Masonic All-Star Marching Band Clinic

This was the third year for this clinic. While I have been involved with the planning of this project since its beginning, this was the first time I have attended the clinic. I spent the entire five days from registration on Tuesday until the Shrine Bowl game on Saturday. I was there, not as one of the leaders, but as one of the many chaperons. I must say that the Masonic All-Star Marching Band Clinic is one of the most impressive projects the Grand Lodge has ever conceived. Of all the things I have been involved with during my term as Grand Master, this experience will most certainly be the high point. There were 207 high school band members in attendance from across the State. The camp provides a wonderful opportunity for our young people. It serves to spotlight our Masonic goal of helping our communities and our youth. It is proof of our desire to support the objectives of our appendant bodies by enhancing the Shrine Bowl game by providing a half-time performance that few college bands could surpass.

On a more personal level, I must add that the experience brought home to me one thing many of us tend to overlook. In spite of all of the bad news highlighted by the news media, the young people of America, our teenagers are the greatest group of people in the world. Our future is in good hands.

3. Area Meetings

Again this year, Grand Lodge Officers held fall area meetings throughout the State. This affords every lodge the opportunity to meet with the Grand Lodge Officers on a more personal level without the formal protocol of an open Lodge meeting. Upcoming legislation is discussed as are ideas lodges can use to create more interest and involvement among their members. These meetings are becoming more and more popular with our members and attendance at the area meetings is improving.

4. Grand Master's Humanitarian Award

This award is presented to outstanding Masons who have made significant contributions to Masonry and to their community. On September 20, I presented this award to W : B : Ralph Townsend in Gering, Nebraska. Brother Ralph is a member of Scotts Bluff Lodge No. 201, Gering and Camp Clarke Lodge No. 285, Bridgeport. On December 6, I presented the Humanitarian award to W : B : Willard Rouze at Imperial, Nebraska. Brother Willard is a member of Purity Lodge No. 198 in Imperial.

Brother Ralph and Brother Willard will be presented during the Public Opening of Grand Lodge.

RECOMMENDATIONS

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1

Amend Section 1-203 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska to delete the word "Stockholders," so that said Section would then read:

"Section 1-203 — THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME - The Grand Master, and in his absence from the meetings, the Deputy Grand Master or the ranking Grand Warden shall represent the Grand Lodge at all meetings of The Nebraska Masonic Home."

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2

Amend Section 1-327 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska to increase the number of members on the Lodge Advisory Committee from three to five, so that said Section would then read:

"Section 1-327 — LODGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE - The Lodge Advisory Committee shall consist of five (5) members, each to serve for a period of five years and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. It shall be the duty of the Committee to advise and work with any subordinate Lodge which appears to be losing ground or experiencing difficulty in maintaining an active and progressive program. It shall also be the duty of this Committee to process all applications to surrender Charters and no Charter may be surrendered except upon the recommendation of this Committee."

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3

Amend Section 2-701 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska to reflect supplies currently available through the Grand Lodge Office, so that said Section would then read:

"Section 2-701— SUPPLIES - Each new subordinate lodge on being chartered shall be furnished by the Grand Lodge, through the Grand Secretary, and under the direction of the Grand Master, without charge, a starting supply of the following items; demits, diplomas, Orders on the Treasurer, Secretary's Receipt Book, Monitor, Ceremonies, Constitution & Bylaws, Secretary's Handbook, Dues Notices, and Delinquent Dues Notices."

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4

Amend Section 1-307 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska to change the name of the committee and also the scope of duties, so that said Section would then read:

"Section 1-307 — MASONIC MEMORIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE - The Masonic Memorial Service Committee shall assist the Grand Chaplain in preparing a suitable Necrology Ceremony to be presented at each Annual Communication. The committee shall build and maintain a list of those brothers proficient in giving the Funeral Oration. Said list will be furnished to the Grand Lodge Office so that they may help lodges with arrangements for Memorial Services when needed."

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5

Amend Section 1-310 — MASONIC EDUCATION; Section 1-322 — PUBLIC RELATIONS; and Section 1-328 — MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE to provide for a more formalized requirement that the aforesaid three committees meet annually and place emphasis in joint planning and identification of programs designed to enhance the image of the Masonic Fraternity, to provide for common goals and programs of the Committees, and to assist in increasing the membership in Nebraska.

The amendment will add the proposed text to each of the said Sections as follows: Add a second paragraph to Section 1-310, and a subparagraph as subparagraph "c" to Section 1-322, and add a second paragraph to Section 1-328, said text reading:

"The Masonic Education Committee, the Public Relations Committee and the Membership Committee shall meet at a date and location to be set by mutual agreement between the chairs of the three Committees, but not later than April 15, of each year to (1) review the activities of the three Committees for the previous Masonic year, (2) to formulate and coordinate goals, plans and programs for the current Masonic year, (3) consider the budget needs of the Committees and available resources, both monetary and personnel to accomplish the goals, plans and programs to be implemented. The Grand Master and such line officers as the Grand Master may direct shall meet with the aforesaid

three Committees to provide assistance and guidance in helping the Committees to accomplish their collective and their individual goals, plans and programs in concert with those of the Grand Master and his line officers."

CONCLUSION

This has been a busy and rewarding year for me and for the Grand Lodge. Most satisfying for me has been my visits to other jurisdictions and to the annual sessions of our many appendant bodies. The growing unity among all of our Masonic family is a beautiful thing to behold. The power for change in our nation and the rest of the world that is possible when the whole family of Masonry can focus their efforts is awesome.

Our All-Star Marching Band Clinic, as I mentioned earlier, is one of the best programs in Nebraska Masonry. I'm proud of the way our local lodges and other bodies have supported this effort. All of the Grand Lodge Officers have pledged their support to continue the clinic.

Our One-Day Degrees will continue in an effort to stem our loss in membership. Many lodges are requesting special dispensation to conduct multiple candidate degrees on their own candidates and the guidelines to perform multiple candidate degrees are being improved on so this type of ritual will be efficient and performed in a consistent and impressive manner across the State.

To all of my Grand Lodge Officers, I give a special thanks. I have leaned heavily on their wisdom and love of Masonry these last 12 months. Never has an outgoing Grand Master left Nebraska Masonry in such capable hands. I can say with confidence that never have I been associated with 14 men with such powerful leadership skills or such concern for their brothers. Masonry in Nebraska will be served well for many years to come.

To my wife Corky, I owe a special thanks. She has stronger 'people' skills than I. Together we make a great team. She sacrificed much these last few years, but she gained as much as I, in new friendships and great experiences.

To my kids, Joe and Cindy in North Platte, and Jim and Debbie in Denver — thanks for your support and gifts, and for your understanding and patience for family gatherings, canceled or postponed. A special thanks for your help with the hospitality room at Grand Lodge Annual Communication.

To all of the Grand Masters that I have had the pleasure of learning under: to M : W : W ayne Luenenborg who appointed me Grand Marshal, M : W : Y James L. "Sonny" Eatman, who appointed me to the progressing line, and to Most Worshipful Brothers Frank Mattoon, Paul Eveland, Tom Tye, John McHenry, Jim DeMoss, Don Pohlman, Steve Mattoon, Jerry Rittenburg and Kaye Ramsey. I owe them all a big thank you. They all had a hand in making me the kind of Mason I am today.

Finally to my lodge, Frank Welch Lodge No. 75, where my Masonic life began and where it will be continued for the rest of my life. Thank you for my top hat and thank you for your support. I promise I'll be at more of the meetings next year.

To all of my 19,000 Brothers in Nebraska: if I have given Masonry one tenth of what you have given me, then I have served you well. Thank you.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE

Harry A. Spencer, 227 & 184, Chairman

The Jurisprudence Committee was called to order at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 5, 1998, by Chairman Harry A. Spencer, with the following members present: Jack H. Hendrix, Steven F. Mattoon, John M. McHenry, and Thomas W. Tye.

Also in attendance were the following Grand Lodge Officers: Kenneth G. Fleming, Grand Master; Don E. Rasmussen, Deputy Grand Master; Dwight E. Smith, Grand Senior Warden; James F. Brown, Jr., Grand Junior Warden; Reginald S. Kuhn, Grand Secretary; Eugene C. Sibley, Grand Chaplain; E. Keith Barrett, Grand Orator; John T. Parsons, Grand Historian; Augustine S. Scolaro, Grand Custodian; Ken D. Beebe, Grand Marshal; Philip A. Lorenzen, Grand Senior Deacon; Michael E. Jones, Grand Junior Deacon; Byron Hust, Grand Senior Steward; Dale W. Anderson, Grand Junior Steward; and Keith E. Yocum, Grand Tyler.

Everyone present was welcomed by Chairman Spencer and invited to participate in the proceedings of the Jurisprudence Committee with the right to ask questions and participate in every way in the discussions, actions, and proceedings of the Committee on Jurisprudence. Chairman Spencer appointed Thomas W. Tye as Secretary for the Committee for the purposes of this meeting and asked Brother Tye to present the report on the floor of Grand Lodge on his behalf.

RESOLUTIONS

The Committee noted that a resolution which had been offered prior to the close of the 140th Annual Communication requesting a change in the Constitution did not carry sufficient signatures and, therefore, was declared invalid. The balance of the resolutions being numbered 1 through 5 were reviewed and discussed by the Committee. All resolutions appeared to be in proper order and can be submitted to the delegates for vote at this 141st Annual Communication. One point of clarification, however, needs to be brought to the attention of the delegates with reference to Resolution No. 3. Resolution No. 3 proposes to change Section 1-304 of the Bylaws.

This particular section of the Bylaws deals with the Committee on Jurisprudence and would require the Committee on Jurisprudence to review all Bylaw requested revisions within forty-five (45) days of the delivery of the Resolution at the end of a particular Grand Lodge session, and determine whether or not it meets all of the necessary requirements so that the proposed Resolution could be submitted for ballot at the next year's Annual Communication. Please note that this proposed amendment deals solely with a requested Bylaw change or revision and in no way attempts to change the existing provisions for amending the Constitution which is set forth in Article XIII of the Constitution of this grand jurisdiction. That provision would remain the same and if adopted, this particular Resolution would only affect proposed changes to our Bylaws and it should be noted that in addition to changing Section 1-304 dealing with the duties and responsibilities of the Committee on Jurisprudence, if adopted, this Resolution would also need to be noted and any appropriate changes made to Section 1-502 dealing with the method for making amendments to the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge. With this explanation, all proposed Resolutions are in adequate order and can be submitted for ballot at this 141st Annual Communication.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

All five (5) of the recommendations of the Grand Master appear to be in proper form and can be submitted to the delegates at this 141st Annual Communication for ballot.

GRAND MASTER'S PERMISSIONS, DECISIONS AND DISPENSATIONS

All of the Grand Master's permissions, decisions and dispensations were reviewed at great length, and after further discussion and the receipt of additional information with reference to many of the items therein contained, the Committee on Jurisprudence agreed that all of the permissions, decisions and dispensations were approved with the following understandings with reference thereto. It should be assumed that permission given to join a service organization should comply with Section 2-609 in that any dues being required to be paid are within the authorized uses as set forth in that section. Further, it should be noted that the dispensation granted by the Grand Master to Capitol Lodge No. 3 become a

moot question in that the individual involved decided upon his own not to proceed with the degrees of masonry. Under Section 2-905, a petition must be referred to a committee and cannot be voted upon until the 28th day after the petition has been received.

It is the understanding of the Committee on Jurisprudence that changes to the Bylaws that have either been submitted for vote at this session of Grand Lodge or are in the process of being submitted for vote at the 142nd Annual Communication will rectify any further problems that the Committee on Jurisprudence might have had with the decisions of the Grand Master, and we, therefore, recommend the approval of those permissions, decisions and dispensations.

VOTE ON TABLED RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 1

Sec. 2-1002 — SPREAD OF BALLOT — A ballot may be spread for multiple candidates collectively. Should one or more black cubes appear in the collective ballot, the Master shall proceed immediately to ballot on each petition individually. Neither the collective nor the individual ballot can be divided and but one ballot box can be used in voting on petitions.

By a show of hands the resolution carried.

Resolution No. 2

Be it hereby resolved that Section 2-514 — Forfeiture of Charter — have stricken from the text of the Bylaw, the following; as underlined:

The failure of any subordinate lodge to meet for four successive months, or to be represented at two successive annual communications of the Grand Lodge, or to make its annual returns or pay its Grand Lodge dues for two successive years, shall be sufficient ground for the forfeiture of its charter. It shall be the duty of the Grand Secretary to give immediate notice thereof to a subordinate lodge appearing in the records of his office to be delinquent in returns and dues.

Following discussion the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 3

Be it hereby resolved that the following paragraph be added to Section 1-304 — Jurisprudence:

The Committee for Jurisprudence shall review all resolutions delivered to the Grand Secretary which shall include request for Bylaw revisions

and determine within 45 days of the delivery whether the resolution or request for Bylaw revision is in proper form. The Committee shall inform the Masons submitting said Bylaw revision or resolution by 45 days by U.S. mail, first class, if said submission is not in proper form, and allow an additional 30 days to place said submission into proper form for presentation at the Grand Lodge Annual Communication.

Following discussion the resolution carried.

Resolution No. 4

Be it hereby resolved that the annual report of the Finance Committee of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska together with the financial reports on the General Funds, Special Funds and Perpetual Membership Funds be made available to each subordinate Lodge Secretary 30 days prior to the Grand Lodge Annual Commication for examination and allowance to make inquiry into income and expenditures at the Annual Communication each year. The only copy of said reports are to be handled by the Subordinate Lodge Secretary and any member may prevail to review those files and submit questions to his representative at the Grand Lodge of Nebraska Annual Communication each year.

Following discussion the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 5

RESOLVED THAT 3-102(g), Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska be amended by adding to the list of allowed Masonic organizations the <u>Masonic Societas Rosicruciana in Civitatibus Foederatus</u> (an organization dedicated to Masonic Education)

Following discussion the resolution carried.

and found that Recommendations 1-5 are all in proper form and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication.

Amend Section 1-203 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska to delete the word "Stockholders," so that said Section would then read:

"Section 1-203 — THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME - The Grand Master, and in his absence from the meetings, the Deputy Grand Master or the ranking Grand Warden shall represent the Grand Lodge at all meetings of The Nebraska Masonic Home."

Grand Secretary Reg Kuhn reported that this recommendation was only house-keeping. Recommendation No. 1 was adopted.

NEBRASKA MASONIC FOUNDATION

Philip A. Lorenzen, 10 & 327, President

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Past Grand Masters, Brethren:

It has been my distinct pleasure to serve as the President of the Nebraska Masonic Foundation for the past two years, following some very distinguished previous leadership of that foundation since its inception in 1985. The Nebraska Masonic Foundation was founded in 1985 as a qualified not-for-profit corporation, as a 501(c)3 corporation under the Internal Revenue Code with the purpose of operating as an educational, cultural, historical, literary and charitable organization exclusively for the promotion, support and maintenance of Masonry. We have prepared as a Foundation a report which is essentially not a part of these Grand Lodge proceedings, but we ask permission of the Most Worshipful Grand Master to address this assemblage and bring you up to date on a couple of things that are going on in the Nebraska Masonic Foundation. It's not uncommon in this day and age that most organizations separate themselves into an operating unit and a foundation for purposes of fund raising. The big advantage of the fund raising activity obviously is that by qualifying ourselves it affords you as Masons another opportunity to give funds for the promotion of Masonry and to do it as a tax deductible item.

Several years ago a site was bought in Lincoln at 11th and Lincoln Mall. That is essentially midway between the State Capitol Building and the Hall of Justice on 10th Street in Lincoln. That property has had a tremendous value, it is an outstanding site and it was our hope and expectation that the foundation would be able to launch a fund raising effort that would allow us to construct a building that would be befitting the image of Masonry on that site in the state capital in Nebraska. Those efforts have not gone as rapidly as we'd like and a catalyst came into play this last year that has changed our course a bit, not maybe tremendously, that is yet to be seen. An unsolicited offer came to the foundation for the purchase of that land from the foundation for \$335,000.00. Given the fact that we needed, in the view of the foundation, an appropriate home for the Grand Lodge and the Foundation in order to provide adequate office space and in order to provide a location in which we could appropriately display the artifacts of Masonry since its inception in Nebraska, we seriously considered

that proposal. We sought the advice of folks that were knowledgeable in the scheme of land prices and how sales were going in Lincoln. After lengthy discussion it was determined that we would accept that unsolicited proposal. What that has afforded us is that the foundation now has in hand a sum in excess of \$330,000.00. That sum was gained without a sales commission, we now have those funds invested and it is the activity of the foundation to actively find a suitable building in Lincoln, Nebraska, or such location as may be ultimately determined by this Grand Lodge to house our Grand Lodge administrative activities, and to provide a place for the foundation activities. Masonry needs to advance and in order to advance we need to be very visible. We are not very visible right now with our location. Our location is too small and in the view of many folks it is grossly inadequate. So this is hopefully the determination of the foundation by this change in direction in terms of now seeking to find at a lower capital cost an existing building that can be adapted to our usages that we can create an image for Masonry in Nebraska. We wanted to bring that report to you as the members of the Grand Lodge, all of whom are eligible to be members of the foundation, for a very modest contribution. Many of you support the foundation on an ongoing basis and we sincerely appreciate that. We invite your input, we solicit your input and your expectations for what you hope this foundation will accomplish. I would like to have the new officers for the foundation for the ensuing year please stand and be recognized. We have kind of a strange circumstance in the foundation—our fiscal year ends on the 31st day of May, but the election of officers coincides with Grand Lodge. For next year our President will be Right Worshipful James F. Brown, Jr., Vice President Most Worshipful Steven F. Mattoon, and Secretary/Treasurer is the Very Worshipful Eugene C. Sibley. Those are your officers for the ensuing year. Thank you.

Two other items. There will be a fund raising opportunity that will continue to fund the operations of the foundation in the form of a return address mailing and that will be coming to you in the next couple of weeks. We expect that once we have identified a building you can anticipate that we will launch a very major fund raising activity.

In closing I would like to read the closing short paragraph of my letter which I think brings the message to you that we would like to share.

"On behalf of the Foundation we thank each of you for your support, financially and in your hope and optimism for the future of Masonry in Nebraska. Masons and the Masonic Fraternity can be a most positive influence in the future, but to be such an influence we must be visible, we must be active, we must be attractive. Through the efforts of the Foundation in concert with the Grand Lodge Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska we believe that the Foundation can accomplish its collective goals and build the strength of Masonry as we move into the next century. The Foundation asks and solicits your continued support, input and insight."

I call the Brothers attentions to Section 1-316 which is on the Committee on Grievances which provides that the report shall consist solely of a recommendation, no fact involved in the controversy shall be reported or stated in the record. With that situation any discussion with reference to the Report of the Committee on Grievances shall be confined solely to that committee's report and no facts or circumstances with reference to the situation can or should be brought to this body.

Ken Fleming -- We are then ready for the vote, all those in favor of the recommendation of the Committee on Grievances vote by the usual sign of a Mason when voting. Down hands. Opposed by the same sign. The report Carried.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC NATIONAL MEMORIAL

Warren D. Lichty, 314, Chairman

The year 1997 was a good year for the Memorial. We accomplished much and our support keeps increasing. One more member jurisdiction has voted a per-capita amount to support the effort, and another Grand Lodge has it scheduled for a vote at its next communication. Also, many, many Brothers have purchased grandfather clocks, address labels, Masonic Christmas ornaments and lapel pins. Brethren have contributed \$250 to become Life Members of the Association and others have contributed \$1000 to become 21st Century members and have their names recorded in bronze on the great 21st Century plaque placed near the main front entrance to the Memorial. Still others have helped themselves as well as the Memorial with planned giving strategies such as "charitable remainder trusts." Of course, we continue to receive bequests from people who remembered the Memorial in their wills. The George Washington Masonic National Memorial is, after all, the only building which belongs to all Masons in the United States.

One of our biggest accomplishments this year was completion of air conditioning in the auditorium. This beautiful facility can now be used all year long whereas before, it was virtually unusable during the hot summer months. This was accomplished by a gift of more than \$100,000 from the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania. This was recognized by renaming it "The Keystone State Auditorium." While much has been accomplished, there is much yet to do.

The National Sojourners have completed a beautiful display on the first floor and it was dedicated in October. The York Rite College is also planning a display at another location on the first floor and High Twelve is going to do a major restoration of theirs.

Another high point of the year was the first seminar for State Chairmen, which was held at the Memorial on August 2. Although we were not able to cover their entire expenses, almost one-half of our Chairmen attended and learned much about the Memorial, the Association and its operation.

The archeological dig on the site of the colonial mansion on the Memorial grounds is being continued and a number of interesting artifacts have been

brought to light. When the dig is completed, these artifacts will be included in a special display in the Memorial.

This year, 1998, is the diamond jubilee of the laying of the cornerstone of the Memorial and next year, 1999, is the bicentennial of the death of our honored Worshipful Brother, George Washington. It is being recommended that many Masonic events be scheduled for '99 to commemorate Washington. The Memorial Association hopes to erect an enormous Square and Compass on the bank between the serpentine sidewalks leading up to the Memorial. It is expected that it could be seen from airplanes landing and taking off at National Airport.

It is also recommended that in June or July of '99, special ceremonies be held in Alexandria or Washington, DC, or both which would involve large numbers of Masons from all over the United States. Such recommendations will be placed before the Conference of Grand Masters of North America at the annual meeting in Philadelphia in February, 1998. It is not expected that we could put "a million Masons" in Washington, but ten or twenty thousand could make quite a noticeable Masonic procession.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GRAND TRUSTEES

Frank V. Lawson, Jr., 1, Chairman

The 1996 Revision of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge authorized the Grand Trustees to select an investment management firm to manage the investments of the Grand Lodge. Having unanimously agreed that doing so would be in the best interest of the Grand Lodge your Grand Trustees selected the First National Bank of Omaha to assume management responsibility for Grand Lodge funds. Effective June 1, 1997 the bank took over Management of the Grand Lodge investment accounts.

During June the bank made major changes in the stock portfolios. This, they explained, was not because they found fault with what we Trustees held but because they, the bank, feel that long term they do better holding stocks that they follow. This portfolio adjustment realized significant capital gains. Most of the realized gains had accumulated over some time so the realization of these gains should not be cause for celebration or for feeling more prosperous. Still it is gratifying to see that over time the Grand Lodge Funds have been able to grow.

Below are selected figures from the Dana F. Cole & Company audit report (a copy of which is on file at the Grand Lodge office) for each of the categories which the auditors use.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Philip A. Lorenzen, 10 & 327, Chairman

The Committee on Finance met during the past year to perform the duties of the Committee as outlined in Section 1-318 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. Those duties include a periodic review of the books and records of Grand Lodge following procedures which included:

- 1. A comparison of canceled checks to the check register including an examination of endorsements to assure proper application of payments.
- 2. Examination of support documents including invoices, expense records and other evidences of obligations to ensure proper payment was made.
- 3. Review of accounts to which items were charged selecting all items in excess of \$500 and randomly reviewing other disbursements of lesser dollar amounts.
- 4. Review of the monthly bank statement reconciliations to verify the accuracy of bank statement reconciliations.
- 5. Review of income items including lodge assessments.
- 6. Review of Perpetual Membership and Scholarship accounts.
- 7. Discussion and review of monthly financial statements.

Following the close of each calendar year, the books and records of the Grand Lodge are reviewed through customary audit procedures by independent certified accountants who prepare and deliver their audit report to the Grand Lodge.

Revenues for calendar year 1997 totaled \$406,519.70. The budget estimated revenues at \$415,792.00 resulting in actual revenues being \$9,272.00 less than projected. Only a few line items were slightly in excess of budgeted expenses and overall, in compliance with Grand Lodge procedures, no category of expenditure was in excess of budgeted amounts. During 1997 the Grand Lodge operated carefully and kept expenditures well within budgeted appropriations. Total budgeted expenditures in 1997 were \$414,862.00 while total actual expenditures equalled \$397,803.37; \$17,058.63 under budgeted amounts.

The Finance Committee found satisfactory verification for all expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and was able to complete its auditing and review process in a timely manner thanks to the well maintained files and help and assistance provided by Chris Rudder as the Office Manager and the staff of the Grand Lodge office. All expenditures for travel and other related expenses incurred by Grand Lodge officers in performing their

duties on behalf of the Grand Lodge are properly documented and accounted for with receipts and other appropriate verification of such expenses being on file in the Grand Lodge office.

On behalf of the Grand Lodge, your committee chairman extends to each of the members of the Finance Committee a thank you for your service and attention to detail in reviewing the financial activity of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

With the excellent results we have had with this format I feel that it should be continued in the future and believe that it will. Also, some lodges have been able to do

their own one-day events to shorten the amount of time for a candidate. These events are becoming more popular, and allow the home lodge to do their own work.

The past year has been a very busy year again for the Grand Lodge Office. The staff has been busy working on the day to day tasks that have to be accomplished in order to keep everyone associated with Nebraska Masonry informed and prepared to meet the challenges that arise on a daily basis.

Keeping up with technology is a priority in today's office. The Grand Lodge office is no exception. The computer equipment and programs need to be updated on a regular basis to enable information to be accessed and distributed in an efficient and meaningful manner. The Office Committee with the help of the staff has been able to keep pace with these challenges in a prudent manner.

Last year (1997) the Office Committee authorized the hiring of a third full time person. We hired Jean Holt. Jean had been helping out in the office in a part

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

This committee met several times throughout the year. Initially a strategic planning meeting for all Grand Lodge committees was conducted by Larry Jacobsen and Dennis Brydl. This afforded the Public Relations Committee an opportunity to coordinate with other Grand Lodge committees.

The committee recognized that the Nebraska Mason magazine is the best established means of communication; this publication's continuance is important to the fraternity. Several options were discussed to improve its marketing appeal. A purpose statement for the magazine was formulated: "To inform Nebraska Masons and friends of the Masonic Fraternity of current and future Masonic activities, to assist lodges in meeting the needs of their members and to contribute to community visibility. Other recommendations included printing on higher quality paper, increasing the dimensional size, and distributing a press guide to the lodges outlining the content of material and pictures to be submitted for publication. This publication would not be possible without the generous financial support of the Order of Eastern Star, the Nebraska Masonic Home and the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children. All three are also responsible for major contributions of articles and pictures.

Several full-color brochures from other jurisdictions and Masonic organizations were reviewed. The committee concluded that this type of publication would be an important addition to the on-going efforts to communicate the Masonic mission to the brethren, friends and prospective members. As there is not an up-to-date brochure available, the committee decided to pursue the development and funding of such a brochure.

The committee is also exploring the possibility of producing a twelve to fifteen minute video on Nebraska Masonry, which could (1) highlight the Masonic

Band at the annual Shrine Bowl football game, (2) cornerstone layings, (3) Masonic charities as well as the importance of (4) local lodge activities.

The year started by meeting with the representatives of our three Masonic Youth Groups. We met with state youth and adult leaders to discuss how our committee may support their membership and for them to interact/communicate with each other. This was perhaps the first time that the three groups have gathered to exchange thoughts and ideas. Items discussed included just a sincere effort by we adults to support our youth groups, others required a financial commitment. Both became difficult to implement within the year, however we continue to work on them and have requested additional funds in the 1998 budget. All did concur that we should continue to meet each year at Grand Lodge. We will do so.

Our youth continue to accept leadership roles and to become involved within their communities, churches, schools, etc. Our Grand Lodge continues to sponsor scholarships of \$750 to outstanding members of each of our three Masonic Youth Organizations, plus this year we planned to award an additional scholarship to the group submitting the most applications on a per capita basis. Each applicant is required to prepare a brief essay, "How my Youth Organization has prepared me for continuing my education." In addition, through the Board's budgeting process, we endeavor to return for investment a portion of earned income annually to insure the continued growth of those funds. Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star members have been very generous with their gifts, and I proudly speak for the devoted members of the Board, the Staff, and the children, when I say THANK YOU from the bottom of our collective hearts. It's because of their hard work and your un-ending support that our Home Family continues to thrive and grow. Truly a most wonderful example of Masonry at work.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

The Nebraska Masonic Home Board of Trustees Plattsmouth, Nebraska

To: All Nebraska Masons

Dear Brethren:

In this ninety-fifth year of the existence of The Nebraska Masonic Home it is my privilege and responsibility to present a brief accounting of the past year's operation.

Again this year I directed that a notice of this annual meeting be sent to every Nebraska Masonic lodge as well as to the Trustees of our Home, Grand Lodge Officers, and the officers of the Grand Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star. This was done in sufficient time for every Secretary or Worshipful Master to advise those interested in attending our annual meeting.

We were shocked at our November Board meeting to receive the resignation of Arthur Sharp, Executive Director, effective January 2, 1998. Citing pressing family health problems, Art who is 66, decided it was in the best interest of his family to retire from the work he thoroughly enjoyed. Art, who was trained in personnel, had been a Trustee of The Home. He was familiar with the problems entailed in responsibility for its operation. Art has been a dedicated Director of The Home which has prospered under his leadership. I commend him highly for 10 years of distinguished service to our Home and Masonry. He was held in such high regard by his associates in the Masonic Home Executives Association of North America that he was elected to their Board of Directors and was later elected to vice president and then president-elect of that Association. He was to assume the presidency of that group at its meeting this June. It was for this reason that we fully expected him to serve another two years as our Executive Director.

Art's sudden decision to retire created an immediate emergency. Fortunately, our Assistant Director is thoroughly familiar with all of the duties and responsibilities entailed in that particular office. Mary Stapp who has a Bachelor's Degree in Healthcare Management, started work with The Home as a staff nurse 24 years ago last October. She has served as LPN Supervisor, later as Administrative Assistant, and for the last 10 years she has been charged with the day-to-day operation of The Home as Assistant Director. Art, for the last several years, has involved Mary in all major decisions of management. Art assures us that she is thoroughly familiar with the duties of the Executive Director and has highly recommended her to succeed him.

At our last Trustee meeting we instructed the Personnel Committee to secure a resume from Mary, to interview her, and if convinced that she could handle the duties involved, to so recommend to the Executive Committee of the Board. They did so and recommended her to the Executive Committee who approved her appointment as Executive Director as authorized by a vote of the Board of Trustees. Personally, I am convinced that Mary is the best qualified person we could find at the present time for this position and in view of my observation of her activities as Assistant Director, particularly her public relations, I am convinced that she will be a very successful Executive Director.

Since our last annual meeting Les Seiler, an attorney at Hastings, Nebraska, replaced John McHenry on the Board of Trustees and Jack Price, of Omaha, replaced Jerry Rittenburg. All Trustees whose terms are expiring at this meeting are being nominated for re-election.

Our budget for 1997-1998 is \$4,021,600. This is an increase of \$121,400 or 3 percent over last year. \$94,900 of this amount, however, is for capital improvements so this increase is extremely minimal. The estimated revenue other than from our Foundation is \$1,706,400 leaving a net to be raised from other sources of \$2,315,200. The estimated income from our Foundation is \$1,817,125.40 leaving an estimated shortfall of \$498,074.60 which must come from the principal of the fund.

Once again I remind you that The Nebraska Masonic Home is the main Masonic charity of Nebraska Masons. Every Nebraska Mason contributes \$2 of his dues for the support of The Home. As of January 1, 1997 there were 20,023 Nebraska Masons so the amount received by The Home from Nebraska Masons from this source was \$40,046 which is less than 1 percent of our budget. We pay the Grand Lodge office \$10,000 for the work they do for The Home and contribute \$12,500 for the support of the *Nebraska Mason*. We receive no other Grand Lodge funds for the operation of The Home. I mention this to show that more than 99 percent of our budget must be raised by your Home Trustees from other sources. This means that we need the full support of every Nebraska Mason.

At the last annual meeting I advised you of the urgent need to add an Alzheimer's Unit as well as a need for some major improvements to The Home. Our Executive Director will undoubtedly tell you that we have been preparing our staff for the problems involved in caring for Alzheimer's patients.

Our Board's project committee recommended following the annual meeting that we proceed with construction of an Alzheimer's Unit upon certain conditions. They were authorized to hire HDR Associates' to do the preliminary work for the architectural sketches. At the April meeting HDR Associates project engineer gave a presentation of preliminary plans and estimated the cost of the projected improvements at \$6 million. Further discussion was delayed on plans until the May meeting for a discussion of a financial model. It became apparent at that meeting that we could not reduce our endowment by \$6 million without seriously compounding our financial problems. Further action was then delayed pending plans for an extensive fund drive which I hope will be underway in the immediate future. Even then we cannot proceed unless we separate the Alzheimer's Unit from the rest of the project until we raise at least \$2 million. We now have approximately \$650,000 in our Alzheimer's Fund.

It is for the above reasons that I urge each Masonic family to include The Nebraska Masonic Home in their annual charitable donations. We are a non-profit corporation and your gifts are tax deductible if you itemize your deductions. I specifically urge you to include The Nebraska Masonic Home in your last will and testament. If you do so, your gift will continue your support of The Nebraska Masonic Home long after you have entered your eternal home.

In the case of a gift during your lifetime, if you give The Home an asset such as a stock certificate you receive the present value of the gift as a contribution to a non-profit corporation and have no liability for the capital gains. In this period of increasing stock valuations some individuals have found it advisable to give The Home stock in which they have accumulated a considerable capital gain rather than giving cash. In this way they get the full present value of the stock and avoid paying the capital gains tax.

The major storm which hit northeast Nebraska did not miss The Home. The excess rain caused our parking lot to cave in. The parking lot had been built over the debris from the original Home which was torn down when we built our 1924 Wing of our existing building. We also suffered extensive tree damage. One large apple tree fell over. One large branch, 14 inch diameter and 40 feet

long, broke off and fell onto a natural gas distribution station on the southwest property. This caused a gas leak, and the gas company asked us to shut off the gas for about 24 hours while the repair was made. This was not a problem as we ran the boiler and generators on our alternative fuel supply. As it turned out we are not supplied by the station that was hit by the fallen tree. In a worst case scenario, I am advised we could have continued to operate up to ten days without gas or electricity. We can operate indefinitely as long as a truck can deliver diesel fuel to our storage tank. Referring again to the storm damage, about three out of every five trees received minor damage to limbs from the heavy snow. Due to the annual pruning we fared much better than other properties which do not employ a planned tree pruning program.

At our September meeting we decided to hold a full-day retreat away from The Home without distractions of any nature to fully discuss all policy matters and our Board mission. We did so at an Omaha location on October 14. We devoted this full day to a frank discussion of the immediate and long-range plans of The Home to see if we were meeting our objective of providing a home dedicated to enhancing the quality of life by offering a continuum of care through gracious independent living and quality healthcare to eligible Nebraska Masons and their female relatives. We concluded that our duty of stewardship was to be certain that The Nebraska Masonic Home

- a. created an environment that encourages employees to constantly strive for excellence
- b. was a leader in the healthcare industry for the people served
- c. provided service with integrity, dignity, and compassion
- d. was financially responsible.

This meeting was so successful that we plan early this year to hold another planning retreat which will include not only all Trustees but our Home and Foundation Executive Directors.

Our census for the last three years has been averaging somewhere in the low to middle 90's. This is about to change with the changes being made in Medicare with home healthcare services starting January 1, 1998. Medicare is severely cutting back on the services it will pay for. This will force some healthcare patients into nursing homes unless they are financially able to pay the provider for the care they are now receiving which will not be paid for by medicare. I am not being critical of Medicare. A cursory study would suggest the care providers were charging what seemed to me to be excessive rates and possibly rendering some unnecessary services.

I am especially grateful to Arthur Sharp, our Executive Director; our Assistant Director, Mary Stapp; our Controller, Robert Kenney; and our Administrative Assistant, Christine Abbott as well as to the other supervisory employees of The Home for the help they have given me personally during the year. I commend them and the rest of the staff for a job well done. I can truly say that our Home is in very good hands.

We are involved with litigation with the Internal Revenue Service to recover the inheritance tax the IRS levied on our portion of the Palmer Estate. The rule was drawn without a careful study of ways to avoid questions about tax exemptions for charitable gifts. Our attorneys Baird and Holm have been very diligently presenting our position in the Federal District Court at Lincoln. The matter has been submitted to the District Judge who will probably be deciding the matter within the next 60 days.

I am pleased with the way Jerry Rittenburg, the Executive Director of our Foundation, has taken hold. He has attended several fund raising seminars and is fairly well indoctrinated to the problems involved in his position. He has made several visits to lodges and star chapters to talk about The Home and is available to provide a program for any group desirous of learning about the services available to Nebraska Masons and their female relatives. Jerry will give a report of his activities at this meeting. His report will include all contributions and bequests of \$500 or above received since January 1, 1997.

I take this opportunity to thank the Grand Master, his Grand Lodge officers, particularly the Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Junior Warden as well as the office staff for the support and help they have given us this year. The Grand Master who has had a very busy and difficult year has always been available and willing to serve wherever he could be helpful to The Masonic Home.

I am particularly grateful to our Trustees for the way they have taken hold this year. All of them especially Marlo Burg, James Erixon, and Gary Radil have been more active this year than ever before. Nineteen ninety-eight will be an important year in the development of The Home. Our Trustees will be more involved than ever. The stewardship they have assumed as Trustees is a labor of love which requires them to contribute of their substance as well as their time. They definitely are living up to their spiritual as well as their Masonic obligations.

Finally, I express the appreciation of the Trustees to all of the individuals, lodges, appendant bodies, and groups that have helped to make this year a joyous and pleasant one for The Home residents. I suggest to all who read this report that they urge their friends to visit The Home if they have not done so. They will see the wonderful job being done by our staff. I am sure they will be interested in helping with this outstanding program.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Nebraska Masonic Home Plattsmouth, Nebraska

The past ten years have indeed been a busy and exciting time for all of the staff of The Nebraska Masonic Home. One of the primary goals with which I was

charged in 1988 was to bring The Nebraska Masonic Home into the twentieth century and prepare for the twenty-first century. This we have done without ever sacrificing the outstanding resident care for which we have long been noted. I would like to give a huge thank you to the Board of Trustees for their continued support and understanding. It has truly been a labor of love to work in such a fine organization as this. Under the leadership of President Spencer, The Home has had a dynamic last ten years.

I would especially like to thank the Board for their stance on the continuing education of the staff and their employees. It is this continuous updating of knowledge and practice that allows The Nebraska Masonic Home to "lead the field" in care of the aged and infirmed Nebraska Masons and their eligible female relatives. The ongoing education in Alzheimer's care as well as all phases of nursing care is an integral part of our in-house educational process each year.

I would also be remiss if I did not give a high commendation to our management staff. Any success we have achieved during the past ten years is a direct result of their hard work and dedication. I cannot imagine having a finer staff to work with than the one we have here at The Home. Their loyalty and devotion to the residents is deserving of my highest praise. I would encourage the Board to tell each and every staff member they see what a fine job we think they are doing and how much we appreciate it. It would mean a great deal to them.

In my annual report to the Board of Trustees in 1994 I encouraged the Board to look closely and take action on some of the many new innovations in health care reform such as home health care. Just two years ago this was a wide open field waiting for caregivers to fill the gap. Now the field is full of "for profit" home health care agencies who are taking the cream off the top of the field. I would encourage the Board in the future to listen carefully to what the staff of The Home has to say and perhaps even have a Board member who would be selected jointly by the President of the Board and the Executive Director act as a liaison person to work closely with the Executive Director and the staff to insure that we are not passing up any opportunities to perhaps reduce the deficit at which we operate each year.

The Executive Director has in the past and will continue to do a great deal of reading to keep abreast of the latest trends in the industry. The information gleaned from this reading should not be ignored by the Board of Trustees. My greatest fear for the future of The Nebraska Masonic Home is that we will not take advantage of the new innovations in the health care field until the extreme need for them is past.

I would like to express a very special thank you to Mrs. Mary Stapp, Assistant Director of our Home, for the many extra hours of devoted service she has given to the successful operation of The Masonic Home. She is truly dedicated to providing the very best of care to our residents and will serve The Home well as Executive Director.

The rest of our staff which includes Mrs. Frankie Cotner, Mrs. Chris Abbott, Miss Amanda Stapp, Mr. Bob Kenney, Mrs. Sonia Meredith, Mrs. Rissa Varney,

Mr. Monte Hackwith, Mrs. Sandi Rippe, Mrs. Rosie Gonzales, and Ms. Glenda Seydlitz are also deserving of our gratitude for the outstanding job they do in providing leadership for our various functions and departments which are necessary for the operation of a facility such as ours. Teamwork is very apparent as they constantly search for ways to be more responsive to the needs of our residents.

I would also like to give a special thank you to our Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Ken Fleming, for his support as well as that of the Grand Lodge officers. Thanks also are extended to the staff at the Grand Lodge office for their helpfulness.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation

To: Harry A. Spencer, President, and the Board of Directors of The Nebraska Masonic Foundation

I am pleased and very proud to present this report to you at this Annual Meeting of Directors of The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation.

The first priority of 1997 was to establish an office for the Foundation at The Nebraska Masonic Home. The old administrative office, just inside the front door, was selected as the most visible location. Office furniture was purchased along with a computer and other necessary equipment. In June, a secretary, Ginger Tuttle, was employed to handle routine correspondence and other administrative duties within the office.

The year started with a number of specific objectives to be accomplished. An important objective was to make as many presentations to Lodges and Star Chapters as possible. Letters were written to each Worshipful Master and Worthy Matron offering a program about The Nebraska Masonic Home. During the year I made 28 presentations at various masonic gatherings and assisted with The Home's booth at Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter. Art Sharp and Mary Stapp also made several presentations during the year. There is potential for many more presentations to increase the awareness of The Home and the many services offered. A large number of members of the craft have never visited The Home. Many of our members and their eligible female relatives are still not aware of The Home having apartments or that "pay basis" is an option.

During the year I attended two fund raising schools sponsored by the Indiana University Center on Philanthropy. Tuition for these schools was part of my severance package from my previous employer. The first was a three day school held in Saint Joseph, Missouri and the second was for five days in Atlanta, Georgia. The schools were beneficial and provided valuable information about several methods of raising funds, the best methods and special promotions others have used successfully. The same person instructed at both sessions and some of the same material was covered at both locations.

A necessary objective for the year was to develop a database of donors and prospective donors, for special mailings and for use in future fund raising efforts. A database has been established and used for one mailing of nearly two thousand addresses. The fields are in place to accumulate additional donor information as it becomes available. Reports and queries are being generated from the database with detail or summarized information based on various criteria.

The Foundation office has provided one or more articles for each issue of The Nebraska Mason and the Hourglass during the past year. Beginning in December the Foundation office assumed the responsibility for The Home's pages in The Nebraska Mason. The March, 1998 issue of the Hourglass will be the first edition planned and published by the Foundation. The transition of moving these functions from The Home to the Foundation is now complete. This has been a learning experience and will continue to be for some time to come.

Two projects nearing completion are the printing of a new brochure for The Home and establishing The Home's web page on the Internet. The brochure is at the printers and will be completed within the next few days. Soon after the printing is completed the same information and pictures will become a part of the web page. Arrangements have been made to have a non-profit organization host the web page at no cost to The Home. As soon as we know the web page address it will be included in the Hourglass and articles in The Nebraska Mason.

The Caring Club recognition dinner was held at The Home on August 9, with a delicious meal prepared and served by the dietary staff of The Home. Following the presentation of plaques and clocks, a special presentation was made to the Ritualistic Divan of Sesostris Temple of the Shrine for their contribution of a parade trailer. This trailer will allow The Home to take part in several local parades and community activities. Following brief remarks by Board President Harry A. Spencer there was a short program in the chapel. The Caring Club had contributions exceeding \$71,000 for the year, which ended with the dinner. We are deeply grateful to all of the friends of The Home for their generosity and continuing interest and concern. For the 1997/1998 year the annual appeal letter was mailed in mid November with a follow-up sent on December 19. As this is written, we have received \$35,986. Everyone contributing \$250 or more are invited and encouraged to attend the annual recognition dinner. The date for the next Caring Club dinner is pending approval by the Board of Directors.

This year many very good and dear friends of The Home saw fit to remember The Home either with gifts directly to The Home or through a bequest at the time of their death. These contributions are very important not only to the daily operation of The Home but to building the endowment fund for the future. Some of those who remembered The Home in their wills this year were: Maude M. Hollingshead, Beulah G. Palmer, Pearle G. Ruby, Myrtle M. Brinklow, Carl Ziler, Pearl A. Bylund, Alice Degner, Lauraine Linder, Stella M. Petersen, Ira Davis, Leonard Burley, Constance Roberts, Irving F. Wiltse, George E. Williams, Lillie B. Murphy, F. Lucille Brooks, Bedrick Wanek and Darrell V. Owens. Although some of the estates have not been closed The Home has received over \$134,000 this year through the generosity of these individuals.

The frequent contact with several members of The Board of Directors and experiencing their willingness to get involved in a very time consuming and meaningful way to assist my endeavors.

The opportunities to represent The Home at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, the Annual Session of Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star and the many Masonic Lodges and Eastern Star Chapters.

There have also been a few frustrations.

Discovering how little I knew about the daily operations of The Home.

Also, in discovering how much time can be spent on a project that may never come to fruition.

In total the rewards have far out weighed the frustrations associated with this undertaking.

In closing I wish to thank President Harry A. Spencer and members of the Board of Directors of the Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation for this opportunity to serve The Home and the Masons of Nebraska. I also wish to give a special thank you to Arthur R. Sharp, Executive Director of The Nebraska Masonic Home for his assistance and understanding. This year our lodge members presented a variety of presentations on Masonic traditions, both within the lodge and in other lodges and Masonic bodies.

Brother Seraphim Weber gave a presentation on the history of the Knights Templar, and their possible and likely connections with Freemasonry. This talk was further enhanced by a slide presentation.

Worshipful Master Arsenios Coolik and Brother Macarius Washburn gave numerous presentations on Masonic history and music. They gave presentations on Chartres Cathedral, Masonry and the American Revolution and the history of Masonic music at one of the Lincoln lodges and also expanded versions of these presentations at the annual convocation of the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin in Appleton, Wisconsin. Brother Washburn spoke on Masonic music and demonstrated it at the Scottish Rite's annual Fellowship Night at the Feast of Tishri in Omaha.

We are pleased to report that the musical research of our lodge continues to have a far-reaching benefit for Freemasonry in the United States, chiefly through Macoy Publishing Company, the largest outlet for Masonic supplies in the United States, who features the "Music for the Masonic Degrees" tape set in their catalog.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

Dwight E. Smith, 205, Chairman

As a result of the approval of Resolution No. 1, Section 2-1002 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2-1002 — SPREAD OF BALLOT — A ballot may be spread for multiple candidates collectively. Should one or more black cubes appear in the collective ballot, the Master shall proceed immediately to ballot on each petition individually. Neither the collective nor the individual ballot can be divided and but one ballot box can be used in voting on petitions."

As a result of the approval of Resolution No. 3, the following paragraph is added to Sec. 1-304 — JURISPRUDENCE and also to Sec. 1-502 — AMEND-MENTS, of the Grand Lodge Bylaws:

"The Committee for Jurisprudence shall review all resolutions delivered to the Grand Secretary which shall include requests for Bylaw revisions and determine within 45 days of the delivery whether the resolution or request for Bylaw revision is in proper form. The Committee shall inform the Masons submitting said Bylaw revision or resolution by 45 days by U.S. Mail, first class, if said submission is not

in proper form, indicate why said submission is not in proper form, and allow an additional 30 days to place said submission into proper form for presentation at the Grand Lodge Annual Communication."

As a result of the approval of Resolution No. 5, Section 3-102 (g) of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 3-102 — ENUMERATED — Masonic offenses shall consist of, but be limited to:...

(g) Making application to, or joining any lodge, society, or institution that shall provide as a condition precedent that one shall be a Master Mason in good standing, or shall have taken the degrees of Entered Apprentice Mason, Fellow Craft Mason, and Master Mason, provided that this inhibition shall not apply to York or Scottish Rite bodies, the Order of Eastern Star, the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, Red Cross of Constantine, National Federated Craft, Allied Masonic Degrees, the National Sojourners, the Past Grand Masters Association, the Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, the York Rite Sovereign College of North America, High Twelve International, Inc., Masonic Societas Rosicruciana in Civitatibus Foederatus, or to organizations which do not require the taking of any obligation and which do not have any secret ritual or ceremony."

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 1, Section 1-203 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1-203 — THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME — The Grand Master, and in his absence from the meetings, the Deputy Grand Master or the ranking Grand Warden shall represent the Grand Lodge at all meetings of The Nebraska Masonic Home."

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 2, Section 1-327 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1-327 — LODGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE — The Lodge Advisory Committee shall consist of five (5) members, each to serve for a period of five years and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. It shall be the duty of the Committee to advise and work with any subordinate Lodge which appears to be losing ground or experiencing difficulty in maintaining an active and progressive program. It shall also be the duty of this Committee to process all applications to surrender Charters and no Charter may be surrendered except upon the recommendation of this Committee."

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 3, Section 2-701 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2-701 — SUPPLIES — Each new subordinate lodge on being chartered shall be furnished by the Grand Lodge, through the Grand Secretary, and under the direction of the Grand Master, without charge a starting supply of the following items; demits, diplomas, orders on the Treasurer, Secretary's Receipt Book, Monitor, Ceremonies, Constitution & Bylaws, Secretary's Handbook, Dues Notices, and Delinquent Dues Notices."

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 4, Section 1-307 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1-307 — MASONIC MEMORIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE — The Masonic Memorial Service Committee shall assist the Grand Chaplain in preparing a suitable Necrology Ceremony to be presented at each Annual Communication. The committee shall build and maintain a list of those brothers proficient in giving the Funeral Oration. Said list will be furnished to the Grand Lodge Office so that they may help lodges with arrangements for Memorial Services when needed."

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 5, Section 1-310 — MASONIC EDUCATION; Section 1-322 — PUBLIC RELATIONS; and Section 1-328 — MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE are amended to read as follows:

A second paragraph is added to Section 1-310, a subparagraph "c" is added to Section 1-322, and a second paragraph is added to Section 1-318, with the text of the added paragraphs to read as follows:

"The Masonic Education Committee, the Public Relations Committee and the Membership Committee shall meet at a date and location to be set by mutual agreement amongst the chairs of the three Committees, but not later than April 15 of each year to (1) review the activities of the three Committees for the previous Masonic year, (2) to formulate and coordinate goals, plans and programs for the current Masonic year, (3) consider the budget needs of the Committees and available resources, both monetary and personnel to accomplish the goals, plans and programs to be implemented. The Grand Master and such officers as the Grand Master may direct shall meet with the aforesaid three Committees to provide assistance and guidance in helping the Committees to accomplish their collective and their individual goals, plans and programs in concert with those of the Grand Master and his officers."

R:W: Dwight E. Smith moved for adoption of the report of the Committee on Codification of the Law. Motion was seconded and passed.

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R:W: Reginald S. Kuhn announced that he had received the following resolutions, which according to the bylaws will be read and laid over until the session next year.

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Be it resolved that Section 2-1202 of the bylaws of this jurisdiction be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-1202 — NUMBER OF CANDIDATES — No subordinate lodge shall enter, pass, or raise more than one candidate at the same time, without the prior written approval of the Grand Master, but the lecture and charge may be given jointly to any number; provided, however, nothing in this section shall limit the number of candidates for the second section of the Fellow Craft Degree."

RESOLUTION NO. 2

"Be it resolved that the Annual Per Capita in Section 2-601 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be increased one dollar (\$1.00) for use by the Grand Lodge General Operating Fund. This is necessary because it is apparent that future operating costs will increase."

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869.

In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was, or is, a member.
